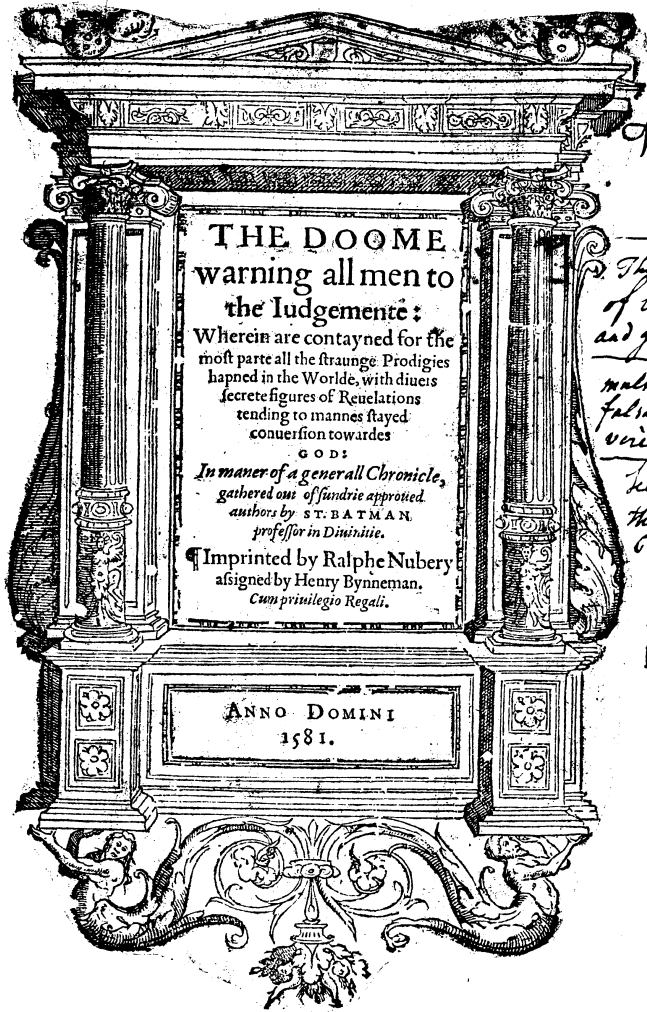
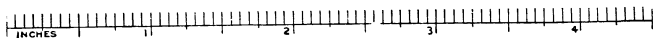

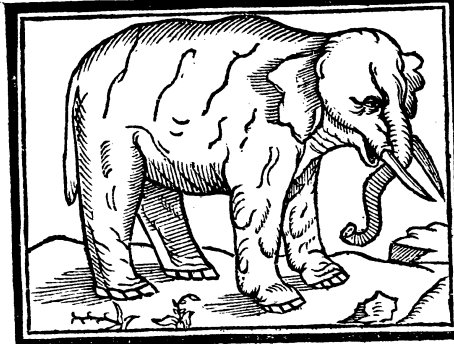
¶ **W**hen the most mightie and blef-
 sed God, Creator of all things, had finished the vni-
 uersall forme and substance of the whole worlde in
 most ample and perfect manner, euen then p̄sently
 the subtil Serpent and enemie to mankinde, as al-
 so of mans saluation, spake in the pleasant place of
 Paradise vnto Eua, not in a worde oꝝ two, but vsed
 with hir both sle and forcible persuasions, & want

ing no artificiall inducing, neither left he off after such sp̄che vsed with

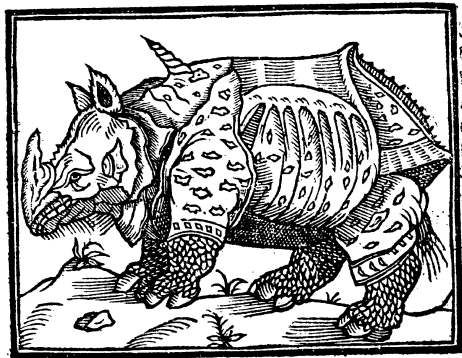

The Elephant is a beaſt of great bygnesse, yet easie to be brought vnder go- vernemente, as it appeareth by widdye discourses whers as they haue bene fortified with engines on theyr backs, whereon men as in Castels were made y more able to encounter the enemye, as re-

porteth Plinie.

Ofont a beaſt greater than the Elephant, he hath thre hoynes crompted on his heade, a head like vnto a hoſſe, his colour blacke: Licolthenes.



Rhinoceros a fierce beaſt enemye to the Elephante, whose bygnesse is also greater, hys colour lyke Wore, the whole bodye covered with scales or shelles, his legs shorte, on his nose a kinde of straighte Hoine, which is his chiefe defence.

A Camel hath two tuſſes on his back, and on hys breast, whereon he stayeth himselfe, when he knealeth down, he hath four teats, his taylor like an Aſſe, hys yuiue members declining backwarde, all his legges haue theyr ioyntes, and his ſete are clo- uen.



Camelopardus so called, by cause he ressembleth y Camel & Lybarde. The Ethiopians call it *Nabis*, a beaſt hauing hys necke like a Hoſſe, hys ſete like an Dre, and his heade like a Camel, he spotted red, one from another, the *Romains* had this beaſt in great admiration after they ſawne it firſt at the playes whyche were kepte at the place in Rome called *Cyrcus*, where they often behelde the fight of many beaſtes.
