


The Doome, vvarning

The Ethiopians call it *Nabi*, a beast having hys necke like a Horse, hys teste like an Ox, and his heade like a Camell, he spotted red, gone from another, the Romanes had this beast in great admiration after they sawe it firste at the playes whiche were kepte at the place in Rome called *Circus*, where they often behelde the fighthe of sundry beaties.
