THE LATUKA AND BARI LANGUAGES

Major J. A. Meldon is kind enough to send us specimens of the numerals in Latuka and in Bari, together with a short Bari vocabulary.

Latuka is a language spoken by the Lo-tuka or Latuka people in the northernmost part of the Uganda Protectorate, on high lands well to the east of the Mountain Nile. They are a very tall race, often with handsome features, negroids rather than negroes.

They were first noticed (scientifically) by Emin Pasha, who in 1882 published a few Latuka words in the Berlin Zeitschrift für Ethnologie. These attracted the attention of the veteran geographer, Mr. E. G. Ravenstein, who at once detected their resemblance to Masai. This was an interesting discovery at the time because the Masai were only known near the East Coast of Africa, and their language affinities were a complete mystery. Subsequently the Masai were found to extend westwards as far as the vicinity of Mt. Elgon and to the south end of Lake Rudolf. But even as it is, there is all the breadth of the Suk, Karamojo, and Acholi countries between the Lotuka or Latuka and the Masai.

The Bari language belongs to the same group but extends to the west bank of the Nile and has received some elements in its vocabulary from the great Sudanian group of languages, of which Madi is one. Bari has been well illustrated by divers missionary and lay travellers since 1855, but we are always glad to get fresh vocabularies as there is great dialectal variation.

As to Latuka, it is a pity some one on the spot does not compile a complete vocabulary and grammar of a language which, from its geographical isolation and its close kinship to Masai, is of special interest in connection with the unwritten history of tribal migrations. If the correct pronunciation of

the tribal name be Lo-tuka, it offers a striking resemblance to the Tukān, Tuken, Turkana of peoples living near Lake Rudolf. (The first syllable, Lo- is a masculine prefix in Bari and Latuka, and corresponds to the Masai Ol-, O'-.)—EDITOR.
