In commenting on the number of these animals in captivity, the writer mentioned two females which were said to have been at Hanover earlier that year, speculating that one of them may have been the Oklahoma City animal. Dr. Thomas has clarified this matter, advising that both females were sent to his zoo, but one was dead on arrival.

ORANG UTAN AND CHIMPANZEE

born in the WEST BERLIN ZOO

On October 9th our pair of Sumatra Orang-utans, BABU and TUAN, which had been imported as adults in 1961, surprised us with a young one. From the very beginning BABU showed correct maternal behaviour, so that is is assumed that this was not her first birth. In contrast to all our other Orangs, TUAN and BABU did not lose their shyness towards their keepers, making it impossible to sex the baby so far.

On November 23rd our 13-year-old female Chimpanzee MOLLY gave birth to her first baby. At first JONNY, the father, who is more than 20 years old. carried the youngone around, before the mother took it over after several hours. However she did not know what to make of it, held it with its head downwards, and seemed to have no milk. So hand raising became necessary. Having narcotized the parents with "Sernyl", given by the ounce (4 mg per kg body weight), the baby, a female, was taken away from them and put out to board in the head keeper's family, where it is thriving well. Birth weight was 1960 g.
