PRESIDENT'S REPORT

TEN OUTBOARD MOTORS FOR THE ZAMBEZI VALLEY

As a result of SAVE's fund-raising during the past 3 months, principally the Royal Show, the "Gods Must Be Crazy — Part 2" evening and the "Dancin' Man" theatre visit, we are now in a position to purchase 10 25hp Yamaha outboard motors. This will be a total outlay of more than \$20,000 and represents one of our major donations for the year.

These outboard motors will be fitted to 10 "Banana Boats", recently donated to the Zimbabwe Parks Department by the Zimbabwe Conservation Trust. These boats will patrol the Zambezi River between Kariba and the Mozambique border in the north east of Zimbabwe. This marks the natural boundary between Zambia, to the north, and

Zimbabwe. The river is only about a mile wide in many places and the poachers can easily cross undetected. They then follow the spoor of rhino and wait for their chance to kill them.

This year, the number of incursions has doubled over last year's figure, but fortunately, the number of killed rhinos per trip is rapidly decreasing. In 1986, when poaching was at its peak, there were about 3 rhinos killed per incursion. Recent figures indicate that this number is down to 1.4. This is probably because rhinos are less easy to find and that their protection is now better than before.

Since poaching began in Zimbabwe in 1984 there have been about 800 rhinos killed and about 90 poachers have been shot. As a matter of interest, when Kenya introduced legal shooting of poachers last April there were 27 shot in the first month.

From the above it can be seen that an additional 10 boats on the Zambezi should make a significant contribution to the detection of infiltrating poachers. Hopefully, this will lead to a further decline in rhino slaughter.

EASTERN STATES NEWS

We are very glad to see that SAVE is now incorporated in Queensland and also New South Wales.

The Queensland organisation has now been together for about a year, but various technicalities prevented their incorporation until quite recently. However, they have been able to fund-raise over that period and contributed \$2500 in July to SAVE. This money was mostly raised by selling T-shirts and memberships. Ricky Caldwell has recently moved to live in Africa for a while, and we thank her for all the work she did in the early days of SAVE in NSW and also for being responsible for the large donations that Gordons Tours have made to SAVE.

We hope that SAVE will continue to flourish in all of the States in Australia and to Richard, Stephen and their teams we wish every success for their fund-raising for next year.
