We also supported the survival fund for threatened Asiatic otters, raising £2800, and have continued with our support for African hunting dogs with a project in Botswana.

As a member of BIAZA we are providing financial support to help save the rainforests in South America. This has enabled the World Land Trust to purchase a huge area of Atlantic rainforest, which is a biodiversity hotspot, to form a reserve for the future.

Our animals have certainly been breeding very successfully in 2008, the lions with their extra ten cubs on display this year have been particularly spectacular. The white rhino have just produced three calves in five months! Quite an achievement and they must be currently one of the most successful captive groups in the world. The small group of free-ranging marmosets is now breeding well and building up numbers; and at last the meerkats are breeding again with the formation of a new group.

We have more lion cubs due, the three rhino calves and all the other breeding successes, so I can say that for 2009 Knowsley Safari Park will have its finest dispay of animals - ever!

2008 has turned out to be our most successful season to date, and has become even



more memorable than 2005, which saw the birth of the first ever female white rhino at the park, Binta calved by Piglet in the November of that year.


The first of this season's births took place in July, when Maru gave birth to a fit and healthy

male calf named Flannery, who at once became a huge hit with the visitors to the park with his high energy antics around the section.
