

One common sensation pervades the mind of every man within the reach of what has been transacting in Court. Upon the case itself, I will not make a single observation.

Lord KENYON.—“ Who is for the prosecution ?”

Mr. Leicester.—“ My Lord, I am.”

Lord KENYON.—“ What do you say to this case ?”

Mr. Leicester.—“ I hope your Lordship will indulge the Prosecutor with time to answer that affidavit ?”

Lord KENYON.—“ If you desire time, we cannot refuse it to be sure. You may answer the affidavit. But if we had known the facts which appear from the Learned Judge's Report which has just been read to us, I believe the Court would not have granted the information.

Mr. Justice GROSE.—“ I should never have granted an Information to a man, who did not come with clean hands.”

Lord KENYON.—“ What Mr. Erskine has so eloquently stated on the part of Captain Hare, most undoubtedly places him in a very high point of view. But merit, however high and distinguished, cannot be set off against a flagrant breach of the law. Still, however, had the Court been acquainted with those facts which appear on the Learned Judge's Report, they certainly would have weighed very much with us before we had granted the Information.

Mr. Leicester.—“ My Lords, I, on the part of Mr. Kenrick, the Prosecutor, am ready to do whatever the Court thinks I ought to do.”

Lord KENYON.—“ If you desire time to answer the affidavit, you have a right to do it of course.”

Mr. Leicester.—“ There is a great deal in that affidavit that presses very hard on Mr. Kenrick ; and I have no reason to suppose that he would not be able to give a very satisfactory answer to many of the facts. And therefore I think I should not do justice to him, unless I applied for time, that he might have an opportunity of answering that affidavit.”

Lord KENYON.—“ The Court is prepared to take it on the Judge's report only.”

Mr. Manley.—“ My Lord, one great object would be gained in this case, if the Court could preserve future tranquillity between these gentlemen.”

Lord KENYON.—“ The Court will certainly attend to that circumstance. There must be a Judgment given, but the Court at present thinks it ought to be pretty much of a nominal Judgment. It is no impeachment of that Gentleman's honour, and I am certain nobody will consider it in that light, to require his entering into a recognizance to preserve the peace. Though the highest merit cannot exempt any person from the censure of the law, I am glad that the evidencé of the transaction enables us to pronounce a nominal Judgment upon so meritorious an officer.”

Mr. Justice GROSE.—“ James Hare, this Court doth order and adjudge, that you pay a fine of One Shilling, and that you enter into your own recognizance in 100l. for keeping the peace for the space of five years.
