In the last months of 1964 the Zoo of the Jersey Wildlife Preservation Trust received a number of new specimens; among them are: 2 pairs of Laysan Teal (these extremely rare little ducks now number approximately 200 in the wild state); 3 Cape Barren Geese from the Antwerp Zoo; a pair of Swinhoes and a pair of Elliot's Pheasants; a pair of European Storks from the Basel Zoo; a male Banded Mongoose; a pair of North American Tree Porcupines from the Calgary Zoo; a pair of Red-faced Ibis from the Basel Zoo; and a nice collection of Ducks from the Rotterdam Zoo: African Shelduck; New Zealand Scaup Australian Black Swans Emperor Geese; Widgeon; Shovellers, and White Eyes.

It is one of the rarest Bushbabies.

Penang — Malaysia

Mr. W. P. Macveigh, owner of small private zoo, informed us about the following newcomers:

New in my collection are an immature but well-grown Siamang (Symphalangus syndactylus); a tame baby Prevost's Squirrel (Callosciurus prevostii); and two Short Pythons (Python curtus). These snakes are about 34 to 60 inches long, and have a much

greater girth than the Reticulated Pythons of the same length.
