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Black Rhino Genetic Research

As the population of free-ranging black rhinoceroses declines rapidly, the need for information concerning the genetic health of the species has become urgent. Dr Michael Worley and Ann Carpenter of the virology/immunology laboratory at San Diego's Center for Reproduction of Endangered Species have isolated DNA clones of the major histocompatibility complex (MHC) of the two subspecies of black rhinoceros. The MHC plays a major role in the recognition of infectious agents as being foreign and in the regulation of the ensuing immune response. Many scientists believe there is a direct correlation between the extent of genetic variation in the MHC and the ability of an individual's immune system to respond beneficially against infectious organisms. Using the DNA clones they have isolated as molecular probes, Worley and Carpenter will determine the level of variation in this gene product in both captive-raised and free-ranging members of the two geographically separated black rhino subspecies.

CRES Report (Spring 1993)

University Honours Zoo Director

The University of Edinburgh recently awarded an honorary professorship to Roger Wheater. Professor Wheater was appointed Director of the Royal Zoological Society of Scotland (Edinburgh Zoo) in 1972, following his

departure from Uganda, where he had served as Director of National Parks. He was elected to the Council of the International Union of Directors of Zoological Gardens in 1980, and became its President in 1989. He has been Vice-Chairman of the Federation of Zoological Gardens of Great Britain and Ireland since 1980, and also serves on various committees relating to zoo and conservation affairs.

Drills in North America

In July 1992, successful drill (Mandrillus leucophaeus) births took place in North America after a lapse of ten vears. The birth of a male at Los Angeles Zoo was followed four days later by the birth of a female at Zoo Atlanta. In both cases, the young were sired by parent-raised males on loan from Hanover Zoo, Germany, Cooperation with EEP institutions has proven essential in bolstering reproduction in the Drill SSP. There were no losses in North America during 1992, and the births are very encouraging. Nevertheless, the SSP population remains small (9.15), and several of the females are post-reproductive; two moves are scheduled to take place this spring in an effort to increase reproductive potential.

All available information suggests that conditions for drills in the wild are marginal, and the potential to assist in conservation activities varies with the perspective of the governing authorities. Unfortunately, permits to conduct a survey on Bioko in January
