Wouter van Warmelo spent nearly five years as Conservation Liaison Officer of the Botanical Society of SA, where he acquired considerable experience in environmental conservation. Owing to this experience, he has become well known in conservation circles throughout South Africa.

As Executive Officer, he is responsible for implementing decisions of the Executive Committee, collecting and distributing environmental information, facilitating communication among members, and between members and outside organisations and, when necessary, acting as a channel between members and Government.

Bop Parks Board leads the way

BOP Parks Board is considered to have the most relevant strategy for the future protection and management of wildlife in Africa. This was the view of world-renowned authority on conservation, Professor John Hanks, at the last Professional Hunters' Association of SA (PHASA) meeting.

On receiving a trophy for the successful utilisation of wildlife resources nationally, the Board's Director, Mr Roger Collinson, said in reply that Bop Parks' role was to protect national resources. To do this all people have to be involved in the process, by en-

couraging them to use their environment wisely. "Only when communities from grass roots level upwards can see conservation as being relevant to their own immediate needs, will they become committed to protecting that which belongs to them. To us, people are as important as plants and animals," Mr Collins said.

The award reflects the degree of success that the Boars people-oriented conservation policies have had to date.
