
Thomas J. Foose



1945 - 2006



With great sadness, the International Rhino Foundation (IRF) announces the loss of its most beloved ambassador for rhino conservation. Dr. Thomas J. Foose, 61, IRF Program Director, died on May 18th at his home in Waynesboro, Pennsylvania. Tom was one of the founders of IRF, an organization which embodies his lifelong passion for rhino conservation, both in zoos and in nature. He dedicated his life to bridging gaps among people with diverse interests and perspectives, as well as using science to foster national and global collaborations for threatened species management.

Author of numerous scientific publications, Tom received a BA from Princeton University in 1969 and was awarded a Ph.D. in biology from the University of Chicago in 1982. He served as the Conservation Director for the American Zoo and Aquarium Association (AZA) from 1981 to 1990, and along with Dr. Ulie Seal developed the very first Species Survival Plan program, for Siberian tigers, in 1983. Species Survival Plans are now a cornerstone for captive species management for the AZA as well as other regional zoo associations. From 1990 to 1992, Tom served as Executive Officer of the IUCN/SSC Conservation Breeding Specialist Group, shaping its programs and focus to include using computer simulated modeling to examine the risks for species extinction, as well as global risk assessments of broad taxonomic groups, including identifying species management and research recommendations.

Over the past 20 years, Tom's tireless efforts to facilitate cross-organizational and international conservation efforts resulted in integrated action plans for species groups ranging from primates to rhinos to tigers, involving zoo experts and field biologists from around the world.

Throughout stints as Program Officer of the IUCN Asian Rhino Specialist Group and the International Black Rhino Foundation, as well as through his work with AZA, CBSG and IRF, Tom touched people across the world and inspired them to set aside their personal, national and institutional agendas to focus on preventing species extinctions. Over the past ten years, his primary focus was leading development and implementation of global and national conservation strategies and action plans for rhinoceros in Asia and Africa.

Most recently, Tom initiated the North American Save the Rhinos Campaign with the goal of doubling the number of critically-endangered rhino populations in select protected habitats in the wild within ten years.

We will miss Tom's many unforgettable characteristics — his sporty safari attire, his penchant for bow ties, his mischievous smile and the twinkle in his eye whenever a rhino came into view. We will miss his dry sense of humor, and his love for the smelly-but-delectable durian fruit (which got him politely ejected from many Asian hotels), as well as many other things. Memories abound many long-time colleagues can't see a Coca-Cola can without remembering the early days (before globalization) when Tom brought several suitcases filled with Coke whenever he traveled overseas.

Tom is survived by his children; Rebecca Foose Nesmith, Thomas John Foose, Ill and their mother Virginia Foose; Susan Foose and Michael Foose and their mother, Ellen Foose, and by his grandson Daniel Nesmith.

The IRF sends its most profound condolences to the family of our beloved colleague, and know that all of his colleagues and friends around the world share in our sadness. Tom's dedication and integrity, his love for his family and colleagues, and his beloved rhinos — as well, his unabashed appreciation for the contributions of all people with a love for wild species - will live on through all of our future endeavors.




Yet here we are...







During the four and a half years that I've been at Save the Rhino, our relationship with the International Rhino Foundation has grown and deepened. This is, of course, partly due to the strength and importance of the projects we have co-funded over the years: Garamba National Park in the DR Congo; the Chyulu Hills rhino project in Kenya; the rhino programme coordinated by Raoul du Toit in Zimbabwe; the Rhino Protection Unit programme in Sumatra, Indonesia; and, more recently, the Selous Rhino Trust in Tanzania and Indian Rhino Vision 2020. This strengthening of the relationship between SRI and the IRF has also been due to the value of and pleasure in working with Tom himself. I especially appreciated, and benefited from, his willingness to share information, to explain the issues involved to a newcomer to rhino conservation like me, and his putting so much time and energy into building networks of organisations that would provide financial and in-kind help for field projects. His communications and organisational skills were exceptional and have achieved so much. I will miss Tom's sense of humour. We had got into a habit of almost daily phone calls and emails, with some long-running jokes that often made me laugh out loud. One of the things Tom enjoyed was the difference between "American" and "English" English, and we had funny times trying to outwit each other with the pecularities of our respective forms: "two nations divided by a common language", as Tom liked to quote. I actually met Tom just once, this time last year, when he came to London for a few days to meet members of the EAZA Rhino Campaign Core Group to give us his thoughts on which field projects might be selected to benefit from the Campaign, and to meet our Trustees to discuss a Memorandum of Understanding between our two charities. After three and a half years of email and phone contact, it was a joy to meet Tom in person and spend time with him. Tom's passing will not mean any less cooperation between SRI and the IRF. We shared information, ideas and ideals; we speak the same language. But I wish so very much that Tom was still here.
