#### **EVERYBODY'S FAVORITE RHINO**

That may be a bit presumptuous, but no one can deny that Andatu, the first Sumatran rhino born in captivity in Indonesia, was a media favorite from the instant he plunked down onto the tropical forest floor in Way Kambas National Park earlier this year. Andatu entered the world shortly after midnight on June 23, 2012, his mother, Ratu, having endured a pregnancy of almost 16 months and her caretakers having pulled out all the stops to ensure a successful delivery. Ratu's



veterinarians had placed her on a hormone replacement regimen to decrease the chances of miscarriage (she suffered two previously); the Sumatran Rhino Sanctuary staff had constructed a special boma for mother and calf, complete with closed circuit video cameras to provide round-the-clock surveillance; and the International Rhino Foundation had flown in rhino specialists from Australia and the United States to be present before, during and after the birth. Nothing about this very special event was left to chance.

Andatu's birth weight was estimated at 60 pounds, which placed him squarely at the bottom of the ladder among the four Sumatran rhinos that have been born in captivity this century. The other three hail from the Cincinnati Zoo. Andatu's father, Andalas (September

13, 2001), weighed 73 pounds, his aunt Suci (July 31, 2004), weighed 75, and his uncle Harapan (April 30, 2007), weighed a whopping 86 pounds. Had they been a litter, Andatu would have been the runt.



Rhinos grow very quickly, however, and he is no exception. At six months of age, the little guy now lugs around about 500 pounds of perissodactyl. By the time he's a year old, he'll probably tip the scales at close to half a ton. In essence, Andatu will increase in weight from a wet sack of corn to a classic Harley Davidson motorcycle (with driver) in just 365 days. That will require some serious "bulking up" – putting on at least two and maybe three pounds per day - which he's very capable of doing.

Only a few weeks before Andatu was born, the president of Indonesia officially announced the International Year of the Rhino, using the impending birth to call attention to the world's two rarest rhino species – the Sumatran rhino and the Javan rhino – both of which are native to Indonesia. Subsequently, Andatu's arrival made national and international headlines, he was filmed as part of the new wildlife documentary, Attenborough's Ark, his photo has been chosen for the cover of International Rhino Keepers Association's 2013 calendar, and he's been friended on Facebook by more than 1,200 people around the world. His horn may not grow to the largest of the world's rhinos, but if he had an ego it surely might.

As we follow Andatu's progress in the months and years ahead, we'll be looking forward to the day when he's fully mature and can make his own contribution to the Sumatran rhino gene pool. In the interim, his father and mother may produce additional calves, and there's perhaps a 50/50 chance that Andalas will eventually mate with one of the other two adult females in residence at the Sumatran Rhino Sanctuary – Rosa and Bina. All of these potential pairings increase the likelihood that conservation efforts on behalf of this critically endangered species will be successful.

#### THE 2013 RHINO KEEPER WORKSHOP IS THIS YEAR!

May 5-9, 2013, the San Diego Zoo Safari Park will host the RKW at the Town and Country Resort, San Diego Ca. A pre-conference trip to the Los Angeles Zoo May 4th and post-conference trip to SeaWorld San Diego May 11th will also be offered. The Los Angeles Zoo visit will feature a behind the scenes look at their Sumatran rhino Haripan and their greater onehorned rhino Rhanda, the oldest female in captivity. Entrance and lunch will be provided for registered workshop attendees. Family members will need to purchase entrance tickets but will be allowed behind the scenes and receive a free lunch courtesy of the LAZ. Participation is limited to 50. SeaWorld San Diego will also have a limited number of free tickets for conference attendees and a behind the scenes tour. More details will follow.

Workshop speakers will focus on in-situ and ex-situ conservation and research, pathology, transportation, breeding, and hand rearing. The visit to the San Diego Zoo will feature a behind the scenes look at our pathology lab, and group discussion on rhino pathology. During the Safari Park visit a morning break out session with classroom and hands-on rhino training will be offered. (20 people maximum.) Park tours will include our state of the art research facility located at the Safari Park-The San Diego Zoo Institute for Conservation Research, the Beckman Veterinary Hospital and our field enclosures. Field tours will visit all 4 species of rhinos housed at the Safari Park and highlight the day. The Park houses over 2,600 animals from over 300 species including 1.7 greater one-horned rhinos (one born Dec. 13th 2012 being bottle raised with mom), 2.1 black, 2.6 southern and 1.1 northern white rhinos; we expect 2 more rhino calves by May of 2013!

At the Ice Breaker May 5th, Cinco de Rhino, a Mexican themed fund-raiser will support the International Rhino Foundation's Rhino Protection Units. VIP guests will be able to attend the Ice

Breaker and hear Dr. Susie Ellis, Director of the IRF, share her keynote address for the Workshop. This year's funding will go to support RPUs in South Africa.

Scheduled Workshop speakers include Dr. Amit Sharma, Rhino Conservation Coordinator, WWF-India, Dr. Dedi Chandra of the Sumatran Rhino Sanctuary, and Dr. Peter Buss of SANParks. Dr. Buss will be discussing the poaching crisis in Africa, along with rhino transportation. Cathy Dean of Save the Rhino will also be a featured speaker. Dr. Oliver Ryder of the Institute for Conservation Research will be discussing stem cell research on northern white rhinos; Dr. Chris Tubbs also of ICR will present a follow up discussion on white rhino phyto-estrogen receptors. SSP coordinators Randy Rieches-GOHRs, and Adam Eyers-SWRs will be discussing rhino transfers. Additionally there will be speaker spots filled by other researchers and rhino keepers, and up to 12-5 minute facility focuses. Each facility focus will be a short PowerPoint presentation on zoos or parks from around the world, focusing on their facility's work with rhinos. Keepers are encouraged to submit their facility for presentation, as these spots will fill up quickly. This is a great way to "get your

feet wet" by doing a PowerPoint presentation on your zoo. A template is available for anyone interested in sharing about their facility. An unlimited number of poster session spots are also available. For a full list of scheduled speakers see the IRKA website.

May 9th the night of the closing banquet, the Safari Park will also offer the opportunity to participate in the Park's "Roar-n-Snore" program. You will spend the night at the Safari Park campground, offering panoramic vistas of the Park's East African field enclosure. (55 acres, over 140 animals from 11 species including 1.6 southern white rhinos and 18 giraffe.) After waking to the sounds of exotic animals you will receive private behind the scenes tours. This package is a \$75 additional cost and will be limited to 30 attendees. Your own transportation from the hotel is required. (A carpool list has already been started for those not having a rental vehicle.)

Roar-n-Snore's campground is also the location of our closing banquet. Attendees will enjoy a buffet style banquet overlooking the African Plains exhibit. A silent and live auction will raise money to help defer the costs of the 2013 RKW and raise money for the next Workshop. Be sure to bring your dollars and items to donate to this fund raiser!

Participating in the IRKA Keeper Development Program can enhance your stay, and help fund your trip here; professional members qualify for reimbursement funds! San Diego can accommodate up to 12 keepers who are interested in honing their keeper skills by working side by side with park or zoo keepers in San Diego; 6 pre-conference and 6 post-conference. (Not all will qualify for KDP scholarships so apply early!) You will work from a truck with your rhinos in huge exhibits housing hundreds of animals. You will learn how to work around large groups/herds of animals, field immobilization techniques, and field training methods. Visit the IRKA website for more details. We look forward to hosting all of you and hope to see you in San Diego next year!


