

RHINOCEROS HUNT IN NEPAL

Last Day Of Viceroy's Visit

NEW DELHI, December 13.

The last day of the eight-day visit of Lord and Lady Linlithgow to Nepal provided perhaps the greatest thrill of all—the unique rhinoceros hunt.

Elephants were used for the encircling beat, and three rhinoceros were trapped. The largest, wounded, charged the line of elephants, but was shot dead by His Excellency. The other two actually succeeded in breaking through the ring, but one was followed up and killed by a member of the Viceroy's Staff. Meanwhile, Her Excellency succeeded in shooting a tigress after a keen tussle between the wild animal and the elephants.

Thanks to the regal hospitality of His Highness the Prime Minister of Nepal, a magnificent shoot produced a total bag for the visitors' stay of 14 tigers, three rhinoceros and one bear.

VICEROY ARRIVES IN CALCUTTA Welcomed By Governor

CALCUTTA, December 13.

Their Excellencies the Viceroy and the Marchioness of Linlithgow, accompanied by the Lady Anne Hope and the Lady Joan Hope, arrived here by special train from Darbhanga at 9-35 a.m. The arrival was private. Their Excellencies and party were received at the station by Lord and Lady Brabourne.

Just as His Excellency the Viceroy alighted from the saloon a salute of 31 guns was fired from the ramparts of Fort William. After the usual presentations His Excellency and the Marchioness of Linlithgow drove to Belvedere, while Lord and Lady Brabourne drove to Government House.
