Dear Sherwood Staff.

GREEN ARROW #40 touched me in many ways, and on many different levels. I thought it was wonderful, and I must thank everyone involved. I find myself with much to say, but do not exactly know how to say all of it. So, I will try as best I can.

From the very first page, Mike Grell's artwork was absolutely stunning. I was captivated by every single panel, and even more so by all of the beautifully depicted animals that graced the pages. I'm sure I'm not the only environmentalist among your readers, but I still have to say there is nothing I find more beautiful than our planet and its wildlife.

Some of the scenes in this issue did wonders to convey that beauty, and to illustrate the delicate balance between predator and prey, producer and consumer, that our whole ecosystem hangs on. It was a wonderful study of life and nature, one from which I hope Oliver gained as much as I did.

I was often reminded in GREEN ARROW #40 of the innocence of the animal kingdom. Violence is a necessity in their world, unlike ours. When a hawk or a wolf kills, for example, it is because the animal needs food to survive. There is no guilt involved, the kill is an integral and necessary part of the predator-prey relationship. Death is one of the most important factors that keep the delicate system of life in balance.

Violence in the human world is a different matter, however. To kill is rarely necessary, nor a part of the struggle for survival. I'm not referring here to the death of an animal to feed a human. That is an entirely different topic upon which I could spend another whole letter discussing. What I am referring to is the violence that occurs all too often in the real world, and that is appropriately reflected in comer books dealing with that world.

The only incident of human violence in this issue, however, was Ollie's conflict with a mechanic's wrench early in the story. I wonder if Mike didn't intend this as some sort of allegory. We see how obviously futile it is to become angry with an inanimate tool, but why is it any less ridiculous to become angry with a fellow man? Ironically, a man shouting obscentties at a monkey wrench probably has a greater chance of getting an intelligent response than do his neighbors who use the same words with each other. It's enough to make a person wonder if the human species really is the more intelligent one.

Take the bear, for example. I was struck with a strange feeling of coincidence when I read the parable of his wisdom. I had purchased GREEN ARROW #40 shortly after helping a friend write an easay about the enviconment, and I had offered her the argument that there is nothing more harmful to our world than the notion of countries and borders, for they lead us to believe that the land is ours to exploit. As an example, I mentioned the song "This Land Is Your Land." Although I am certain Mr. Guthrie had only the best intentions when he wrote the tune, it takes on a different meaning in today's world of increased environmental awareness.

It's time we realized that this land does not belong to you and me, but that we instead belong to it. The land has been here longer than we have, and providing we don't screw things up too badly, it will remain here long after we pass away. As Mike Grell stated, the bear dies, but the land goes on without him. When we die, our children will live off the land we leave behind. It would be wise of us to start taking care of it for them now, and give them a greener world than the one that was handed down to us.

Thank you once again, Mr. Grell, for another entertaining and enlightening issue. Stories like these are what make GREEN ARROW such an ecjoyable title for me to read. I will look forward to reading more of your outstanding work as I continue to follow Ollie on his journeys.

GREEN ARROW is my second favorite American comic book. GrimJack rules. So that you know who wrote this. I'm 29, male, teaching English and History and fighting.


