Captain Thomas Williamson (1758/9-1817) retired from India in 1798, after publicly criticising the Government's Military Policy, and brought back with him sketches for the book of aquatints to be engraved from watercolours and published as 'Wild Sports of the East' or 'Oriental Field Sports'. Around 1800 Samuel Howitt, presumably in conjunction with Williamson, since the former had never been to India, prepared a series of watercolours based upon Williamson's drawings.

When Howitt's watercolours were completed, Edward Orme had been chosen as the publisher, and the various plates were engraved by H. Merke, J. Hamble and Viveres and published as aquatints in 20 parts, 1805-7, together with Williamson's extensive text. (A further, smaller and cheaper edition was produced in 1808 in two volumes, and there was another edition in 1819).

It may be recalled that in 1971 we exhibited 15 watercolours (henceforth referred to as 15 (1971)) related to these aquatints which had formerly belonged to Mrs. H. E. Leigh of Stow-on-the-Wold, Gloucestershire, a member of the Egerton Family, and that in our catalogue we mentioned the fact that around 1949/50 the firm of Harold Hill of Newcastle also had some watercolours connected with the series. It is these watercolours, from the Collection of the Earls of Ducie, which we offer below.

The 15 (1971) drawings were each titled and numbered on the original mounts up to No. 44 (whose subject corresponded to Plate XXIX in the final book), thus suggesting that Howitt had originally drawn 44 subjects (and possibly 48 for two volumes) from which perhaps the publisher Orme, together with Williamson, then selected the 40 subjects and frontispiece which we now exhibit. (Plate XIII is in fact a hand-coloured etching).

The existence of two versions of some subjects may well have been the result of Orme and Williamson asking Howitt to make small alterations or simplifications for the engravers, and in all probability it is from the present series that the engravers worked, as these correspond more closely to the final aquatints than the 15 (1971). The fact that the numbering on the 15 (1971) does not conform with that on the finally-published plates would appear to confirm this. The present set were not numbered on the mounts.

With the exception of the etching, Plate XIII, there are 40 watercolours exhibited, of which 32 are on a paper identical to that of the 15 (1971). The further 8 including the frontispiece are on softer paper, one sheet of which is watermarked J. Ruse 1799 and in some cases these are not quite so fine as the others in the series, a fact which may be explained by the original drawing having been damaged by the engraver, after which Howitt was asked to re-draw to complete this set. Although none of the 15 (1971) were signed, and 16 of the present series are, where one subject is repeated it is not necessarily signed in the present version.

Before framing, the present drawings were bound in a crimson morocco album by Rodwell of Golden Square, and the interleaving sheets were watermarked 'W. Balston, 1811', thus suggesting a binding of about that date, after the first two editions had been published. The boards on which the drawings were originally mounted are white, with grey wash and border, and are watermarked: W. Elgar, J. Ruse, 1799, J. Russell, J. Whatman, W. Turner and Son. The date of 1799 indicates that all the drawings were made around 1800, and it is interesting to note that in the original edition the text was

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watermarked E and P (Edmeads and Pine) 1804, the Index, J. Ruse/1803, Parts 1-14, J. Whatman/1804 and Parts 15-20 E. and P. 1804. It is clearly speculation, but the similarity of the paper and their manufacturers does possibly indicate that all these drawings were handled by the publisher and were his own set, or possibly that of Capt. Thomas Williamson—such a view is also supported by the presence of an etching amongst them.

It is from the re-numbering of the 15 (1971), the fact that there is no connection between the numbers on these and the order in which Edward Orme published the aquatints (the plates came out in nothing like the final order, i.e. Part 1 contained pl. I and II, Part 2, pl. IV and XVI etc.) coupled with the fact that we believe that some of the 15 (1971) are of marginally finer quality and not so close to the aquatints, that we believe that where there is now another version, then this may be contemporary but a little later in execution, but all the works shown here (and those shown in 1971), are entirely by the artist's own hand.

In the collection which formerly belonged to C. F. G. R. Schwerdt were 13 sepia drawings related to some of the present plates.

15. The Frontispiece for Oriental Field Sports.

A tiger lying upon a rock, on the front of which is a creeper, to either side are palm trees.

Size: $9\frac{1}{4} \times 13\frac{1}{4}$ inches. Signed.

16. 'Hunters going out in the Morning'.

A forest camp with sportsmen preparing to leave and several dooreahs with hunting dogs.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 4th June, 1805. Plate i. *Note:* Another version of the subject, with considerable differences, was exhibited here in 1971 and numbered 1.

Three hunters are seen in the foreground, with a hog fleeing from the canes. Beyond the beaters is a mounted elephant, and a bungalow.







18. 'The Chase after the Hog'.

Mounted hunters chasing a hog into a field of sugar cane where natives are working.

Size: $11\frac{3}{4} \times 16\frac{7}{8}$ inches.

Signed.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st September, 1805. Plate iii. *Note:* Another version of the subject, with considerable differences both in colour and composition, was exhibited here in 1971 and numbered 3.

19. 'The Hog at Bay'.

Several hunters are attacking a hog, one horse and its rider on the ground in the foreground.

Size: $11\frac{5}{8} \times 16\frac{7}{8}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st April, 1806. Plate iv. *Note:* We believe this may be a slightly later version of the subject matter but the paper is watermarked 1799 J. Ruse and another version, with considerable differences, was exhibited here in 1971 and numbered 6.

20. 'Hog Hunters coming by surprise on a Tigress'.

Beyond is an enormous row of native beaters and elephants.

Size: $11\frac{7}{8} \times 17\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 4th June, 1805. Plate v. Note: We believe that this may be a slightly later version of the subject matter and another version, with considerable differences, was exhibited here in 1971 and numbered 4.

21. 'The Dead Hog'.

Two hunters, native servants and their dogs examine the kill.

Size: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 16\frac{7}{8}$ inches. Signed.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st November, 1805. Plate vi. (See illustration plate vi)

22. 'The Return from Hog Hunting'.

To the left are mounted hunters, servants carrying their spears, others carry the dead hogs on bamboo poles, the cantonment seen to the right under trees.

Size: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 17$ inches. Signed.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st November, 1805. Plate vii. (See illustration plate vii)

23. 'Driving Elephants into a Keddah'.

In the foreground a gentleman and his lady watch the spectacle from the howdah of an elephant, as does an officer accompanied by his bearers.

Size: $11\frac{5}{8} \times 16\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 4th June, 1805. Plate viii Note: We believe that this may be a slightly later version of the subject. (See illustration plate vii)

24. 'Koomkies, or Decoy Elephants, catching a Male'.

Whilst the decoys stand nearby, the front feet of the male are tied together, and one of its rear feet is attached to a tree.

Size: $11\frac{3}{4} \times 17$ inches.

25. 'Decoy Elephants leaving the Male attached to a Tree'.

26. 'A Rhinoceros hunted (or bayed) by Elephants'.

Five elephants surround the rhinoceros in a swamp, a wounded elephant to the right.

27. 'A Tiger prowling through a Village'.

The tiger is sneaking into the village past palings, towards a pool where can be seen cattle and dogs.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st April, 1806. Plate xii.

28. 'The Tiger seizing a Bullock in a Pass'.

Hand coloured watercolour over etched line.

Size: $12\frac{7}{8} \times 17\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st January, 1806. Plate xiii.

Note: An original watercolour of this subject numbered 10, was exhibited here in 1971.

29. 'Shooting a Tiger from a Platform'.

A native, perched in a tower is shooting the tiger feeding on a dead bullock.

Size: $11\frac{5}{8} \times 16\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st September, 1805. Plate xiv. *Note:* Another version of this subject with considerable differences, was exhibited

30. 'Driving a Tiger out of a Jungle'.

Elephants carrying hunters approach the tiger who is seen in undergrowth to the left.

31. 'Chasing a Tiger across a River'.

Numerous hunters mounted on elephants, one in the foreground shooting the tiger who is swimming across the river to the left.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 4th June, 1805. Plate xvi. Note: We believe this may be a later version of the subject.

32. 'The Tiger at Bay' or 'Shooting the Tiger'.

Several hunters mounted on elephants surrounding the tiger in marshy land.

A group of five elephants with the tiger attacking the leading one, and other hunters coming to the rescue.

34. 'The Dead Tiger'.

The shooting party reassembles to inspect the kill. Plate xix.

35. 'Shooters coming by surprise on a Tiger'.

The tiger is seen to the left holding a dog; two shooters, one on an elephant, another on foot, are in the centre and to the right is a bearer carrying game.

37. 'A Tiger Killed by a Poisoned Arrow'.

Size: $11\frac{3}{4} \times 16\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st January, 1807. Plate xxii.

38. 'Shooting a Leopard'.

A hunter shoots from an elephant the leopard which is in a tree to the left, with numerous dogs below.

Size: $11\frac{3}{4} \times 17$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 4th June, 1806. Plate xxiii.

39. 'Exhibition of a Battle between a Buffalo and a Tiger'.

A stadium constructed from bamboo poles, to the top of which cling numerous natives. To the right is a covered stand where sit Indian Nobility, Officers and their ladies.

Size: $11\frac{1}{2} \times 16\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st January, 1807. Plate xxiv. *Note:* A related sketch for this watercolour is in the British Museum.

40. 'The Buffalo at Bay' or 'Hunting an old Buffalo'.

The animal is seen surrounded in marshy ground by hunters on elephants.

Size: $11\frac{5}{8} \times 16\frac{7}{8}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st January, 1807. Plate xxv.

41. 'Peacock Shooting'.

A peacock is flighted from a pond, on which there are two storks: to the left are shooters with their servants.

Size: $11\frac{3}{4} \times 16\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 4th June, 1805. Plate xxvi.

Note: Another version of this subject, with considerable differences, was exhibited

here in 1971, and numbered 27.

The pencil work in the background, which represents palm trees which are shown in the other version, confirms the view that this version may be a little later. The aquatint does not show these trees, thus suggesting that the engraver worked from this version.



42. 'Shooting at the Edge of a Jungle'.

A pool to the left, and a native holding two dogs which have sighted a hare.

Size: $11\frac{3}{4} \times 16\frac{7}{8}$ inches.

Subject engraved by J. Hamble and published 1st September, 1806. Plate xxvii. *Note:* Another version of this subject, with considerable differences, was exhibited here in 1971 and numbered 30.

43. 'Driving a Bear out of Sugar Canes'.

To the left are hunters, the bear in the centre under a tree from which a native is about to shoot.

44. 'The Death of the Bear'.

The bear surrounded by hunters, some with guns, others with spears an elephant with howdah beyond.

45. 'Hunting a Kuttauss or Civet Cat'.

A hunter on an elephant, with numerous natives and dogs by a water-garden.

46. 'Jackals rescuing a Hunted Brother' or 'Hunting Jackals'.

Dogs and jackals fighting to the right, huntsmen approaching through water from the left.

47. 'Chase after the Wolf when carrying off a Lamb.'

Natives with their dogs are pursuing the wolf, paddy fields and a river beyond.

48. 'The Common Wolf Trap'.

At the edge of a village a kid, suspended in a basket over a pit, to entice the wolves to climb in.

49. 'Smoking Wolves from their Earths'.

Soldiers and natives, from a camp seen in the distance, are attacking wolves in a ravine.

50. 'The Ganges breaking its Bank, with Fishing etc'
Flamingoes to the left, and natives fishing in the right foreground.

Subject engraved by H. Merke and published 1st September, 1805. Plate xxxv. *Note:* Another version of this subject, with considerable differences, was exhibited here in 1971 and numbered 39.

51. 'Killing Game in Boats' or 'Killing Game at the Inundation of an Island'. In the foreground are natives attacking a tiger, and to the right are buffalo in a swamp.

52. 'Dooreahs, or Dog-Keepers, leading out Dogs'. A Scene in a cantonment with numerous dogs and two horses in a stable to the left.


Huntsmen mounted on horses and an elephant pursuing the deer across a small stream.




