MAI POKHARI IN DANGER

A group of geologists from Department of Geology and Namsaling Community Development Center investigating the reasons for the drying of the Mai Pokhari lake and wetland in Ilam, eastern Nepal doesn't have concluded that there is no geological reasons for drying up of water. The wetland is situated at an altitude of 2121m and is enlisted in the list of Ramsar sites since 28 October, 2008. According to the scientists, to increase the level of underground water for the lake, small water recharging ponds should be built around the area.

ELECTRICITY LEAKAGE AT SINDHUPALCHOWK

About 40 per cent of electricity is being leaked illegally in rural areas of Sindhupalchok district, central Nepal. According to Nepal Electricity Authority, local people in remote areas of the district lighten their houses by using hooks on transmission line. Authorities have already arrested two local people and penalized NPR 23,757 for such illegal activity.

ONE-HORNED RHINO KILLED IN ASSAM

Poaching of one horned rhino continues unabated in Assam, northern India as one more female rhino was killed by the poachers at Rajiv Gandhi National Park in Darrang district of the state. According to the officials, this is the 26th rhino that was killed by the poachers in Assam in 2014 and since 2001 a total of 193 one-horned rhinos have been killed by the poachers in the area.

GAS HEAT PROJECT REDUCES EMMISSION

More than 100,000 households are now equipped with gas facilities in Lhasa, Tibet Autonomous Region southwestern China which has made the lives of locals easier in winter and also reduced emission of harmful gases. The heating project was launched at the end of 2012 and people were provided facilities at very affordable price. This project has reduced total emission of carbon dioxide by around 180,000 tons, sulfur dioxide by 1,652 tons, nitrogen oxide by 510 tons, soot emissions by 2,544 tons and cinders by 13,900 tons.

MORE BLACK NECKED CRANE IN BUMTHANG

Bumthang district in central Bhutan has recorded the highest number of black necked cranes in the last two decades. Till date, 34 cranes have been spotted in Bumthang, 22 in Gyetsa, four in Tang and eight in Dramphel. According to the Division Forest Office (DFO), number of cranes visiting Bumthang this year is approximately double than the last year. Earlier only around 10 to 15 cranes flew in at this time of the year.
