# REPORT.

The history of the Institution, during the past year does not present any very remarkable novelty, and therefore does not require to be dwelt on at any length. There has, however, been a steady progress in the fulfilment of its designs, and its present position is favourable for increased usefulness to the County.

Our funds are in a more satisfactory state than they have hitherto been. The produce of the bazaar took off £300 from the mortgage debt, and entirely liquidated the floating debt; and after laying out from the same source £10 10s. on the purchase of minerals offered at an unusually low price, a balance of £23 16s. 5d. remains applicable either to further reduction of the debt, or to the purchase of additional cases, which are much needed.

On the ordinary account the Council have been enabled to expend a large sum in putting the roof and skylights in thorough repair, and to pay £13 10s. for the services of an Assistant Curator, who has done much in arranging and ticketing the various objects

in the Museum.

The number of visitors has considerably exceeded that of the preceding year. In the Whitsun week, the experiment was tried of charging one-half the usual admission fee, and the result was sufficiently successful to induce us to recommend that the same course be followed at Christmas.

Your Council have taken steps during the year, to ascertain in whom the proprietary shares in the Institution are actually vested. In doing this, they have been chiefly guided by Rule V, and many shares have been transferred, and the fees have been paid accordingly. But some doubts have arisen as to its construction, and we therefore propose that it be remodelled and stand in future as follows:—

"Shares may be bequeathed, but if they be not specifically mentioned in the bequest, the party claiming to take a beneficial interest thall pay to the Royal Institution a fee of £1 ls. in respect of each share. When shares shall be left generally as residue, the person entitled shall pay the above fee, and if more than one person is entitled to the property, one only shall be admitted to the benefits of each share, and that only on the production of a written transfer in his or her favour, from the other legatee or legatees of his, her, or their part or parts in the property of the said share."

The annual charges have been further reduced by the exemption from parochial rates, which has been secured under a recent Act of Parliament.

Under these circumstances we should indulge the hope that our operations might be at least maintained on the same scale as heretofore, but our means are still too limited to admit of our obtaining the services of an Assistant Secretary and Curator, whose time should be entirely at our command, services which have long been felt by those most interested in the Institution, and best aware of its capabilities of expansion, to be quite essential to its full success. It is therefore with peculiar satisfaction that we announce an offer from one, whose benefactions have been recorded in every Report, Major Jenkins, guaranteeing, for three or four years, the payment of the salary of a person properly qualified for the duties above mentioned.

In this liberal offer, Major Jenkins has had partly in view the attainment of an object he has looked on, in common with other members, as very desirable and particularly appropriate to this Institution, that of perfecting a Record of the Parochial History and Statistics of the County. For doing this, plans have been, from time to time, proposed among us, which have failed, in consequence chiefly of our being unprovided with a secretary whose time could be devoted to the carrying them into effect. We may now confidently anticipate results creditable to the Institution and serviceable to

the public.

But for the direction of the labours of such an officer, the co-operation of members will be especially required, and it is hoped that the expectation of accomplishing some definite works, will induce those interested in particular subjects to unite for the purpose of pointing out the most eligible method of proceeding. It was suggested in the course of last year, that the forming within the Institution of a certain number of sectional divisions for the cultivation of particular departments would tend to increase our activity and productiveness. The meeting of members at times convenient to themselves for the furtherance of a common and favorite pursuit as antiquities, natural history, or statistics would probably be more fruitful as well as agreeable than the periodical general assemblages of the whole body. These last would, however, be benefited in their turn, by the communication from the several sections of such matters as were best adapted for a mixed audience.

The evening meetings of the members have been continued, and several interesting papers have been communicated to them. Among these may be noticed an account of and disquisition on the old church of Perranzabuloe, as having been published at the request of the society, though it now appears in an expanded shape, con-

stituting a pleasing and popular volume.

Other valuable antiquarian notices have been read on those occasions, and will be printed entire or in abstract, with this Report, together with the various contributions to our knowledge of the natural history of Cornwall. These publications associated with our Fauna, have raised our Institution to a very creditable rank among provincial societies, and we received a pleasing testimony of this

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estimation in the reception given by the British Association at York to Mr. C. W. Peach, who, as our delegate, attended the meeting, by which we were recognized as a Society publishing Transactions.

The printing of the third volume of our Fauna is completed, and

it will very speedily be published.

We are, as usual, indebted to a long list of friends who have contributed to our Museum. Among those we feel bound to record our obligations to Mr. Dawe, who has sent a magnificent collection of fossil bones from India. We are also glad to express our thanks for several specimens of recent osteology, from Mr. Clogg, of Liskeard,—the museum being rather deficient in this department, which is the essential basis of all accurate knowledge of animal structures.

Our meteorological observations have been regularly continued, and they have enabled us to co-operate in two great attempts to turn this department of science to practical account—the one in its relations to agriculture under the auspices of the British Agricultural Society—the other under the direction of Mr. Farr, of the Registrar General's office, who in association with the Astronomer Royal, has been engaged in ascertaining the reciprocal relations of the changes of weather and the changes of public health,—an investigation which will no doubt be long continued, and which cannot fail when undertaken by men at once so able and so favorably circumstanced, to advance our knowledge on this universally interesting subject to a most important extent.

## APPENDIX I.

Description of the Old Church of Saint Piran, by the Reverend W. Haslam, A.B.

# APPENDIX II.

Description of an Ancient Urn found at Gerrans, with remarks on the various Sepulchral Urns discovered in Cornwall, by J. M. Winn, M.D.

(Read July 5, 1844.)

The ancient sepulchral urn, which I have the pleasure of presenting to the Royal Institution of Cornwall, was found at Merrows, in Gerrans, on the 4th of May last. It was discovered whilst the farmer was ploughing his field, by the ploughshare coming in contact with the stone which covered the urn. I visited the neighbourhood to ascertain every particular respecting this interesting remnant of antiquity.

The spot whence it was removed is situated in a field about fifty yards from the junction of two gentle-sloping hills, and a quarter of a mile from the sea; the field is composed of deep-black mould, and has been cultivated for more than sixty years. The urn, when found,
