Births & Hatchings, Continued

Group 2 is two adults (Marino and Robin) and their infant born on 20 April. This birth is significant in that this pair had been housed next to a pair of aggressive Geoffroy's tamarins (S. oedipus geoffroyi) for over a year and no live births had occurred. We believe the stress caused by fighting between the two species was a factor in the unsuccessful breeding attempts of this pair. We responded by relocating them to another enclosure between a pair of Red-bellied tamarins (Saguinus labiatus thomasi) and their offspring and Group 1 Golden lion tamarins. It was commonly thought that housing two of the same species next to each other would interfere with breeding; but both pairs were successful. This was the first live birth for this pair but unfortunately one twin was stillborn.

Group 3 is a pair that has been together for about a year. They are interacting well but as of this report there has been no offspring.


Also worth noting was our first birth in recent years of a White-handed gibbon (Hylobates lar) born on 12 Otober 1989. We are glad to report that he is doing great! submitted by Patti Brinkley, Primate Keeper, Monkey Jungle, South Florida AAZK Chapter, Miamo, FL.)

Chamarajendra Zoological Garden (Mysore, India)...has reported the following significant births and hatchings during 1988 and 1989: Pundareeka Rao, warden, relays the exciting news of the birth of a Black rhinoceros (Diceros bicornis) at their facility. Other live births include four Civit cat (Viverricula indica), five Toddy cat (Paradoxurus hermaphroditis) six Tiger (Panthera tigris), two Jungle cat (Felis chaus) and one Leopard cat (Felis bengalensis).

Important hoofstock births include one Indian camel (Camelus dromedorius), one Thamin deer (Cervus eldi) and four Indian gazelle (Gazella gazella). During this time two Brown lemur (Fulvis fulvis) were also born.

Significant hatchings include two Sarus crane (Grus antigone) and six Black swan (Cygnus atratus). New additions for 1988 and 1989 include 1.1 Giraffe (Giraffa camelopardalis), 0.2 Brown lemur (Fulvis fulvsi), 1.1 Red Kangaroo (Macropus rufus) and 1.1 Asiatic lion (Panthera leo). submitted by Lisa Hughes, Zoo Atlanta Chapter Liaison. The Dreher Park Zoo is proud to announce their first successful breeding of a Hoffman's sloth(Choloepus hoffmani). The group of 1.2 was acquired from Lincoln Park Zoo in 1985. They had been housed at Lincoln Park Zoo since 1977 and were listed as born in 1975. Both females had miscarried in past years. We instituted a diet change in January of 1990 based on the Burnet Park Zoo's diet and feel this may have led to the successful birth of a single youngster on 10 April 1990. 

The most exciting mammal birth occurred on 30 May when our five-year-old female Reticulated giraffe (Giraffa camelopardalis reticulata) "Jambo" gave birth to her first offspring, a female, while on exhibit in full public view. The birth lasted 43 minutes and the calf was on her feet one hour after being born. The first nursing was observed three hours after birth and the calf continues to prosper.

The most significant bird hatchings occurred in January when two pair of Ruppell's vultures (Gyps rueppellii) each produced a chick for the second consecutive year. The chicks are being raised by their parents in the multi-species African Veldt Exhibit. Other animals that share the exhibit with the vultures include: Reticulated giraffe, waterbuck, Thomson's gazelle, East African crowned cranes, and Kori bustard. submitted by Anita Schanberger, Chapter Liaison, AAZK Central Arizona Chapter, Phoenix, AZ.

Knoxville Zoo...the Knoxville Zoo Chapter of AAZK (Smoky Mountain) is pleased to report several births and hatchings spanning the Fall of 1989 to February 1990. 2.0 Arabian oryx (Oryx leucoryx) calves were born in September. These calves represent the first successful breeding of this highly endangered species at our zoo. The oryx is one of 17 species managed under an SSP program at our zoo.

On 2 February, Dolly, a Southern white rhinoceros (Ceratotherim simum simum) became a mother for the fifth time. The female calf, Yvonne, is the progeny of the first successful breeding for Mondo, a new founder male previously unrepresented in the population. Mondo arrived at KZG from Baton Rouge Zoo during May of 1988 in a transfer conducted through the Rhino SSP. We are extremely proud of our breeding record for this species - 14 calves born to date.

0.0.5 Black-footed penguins (Spheniscus demersus) have hatched at the Marine Animal Complex. These are the first penguin chicks to be produced at our facility, and they bring our penguin collection to a total of 13 birds. The Black-footed (or "Jackass") penguin is

"Bowling for Rhinos" Update

In speaking recently with Nanci Pintavalli and Andy Lodge, it was learned that AAZK's first ever national fundraiser, "Bowling for Rhinos" has raised approximately \$150,000 with still more final tallies left to come in . Andy reports that the airplane purchased by Ngare Sergoi Support Group with funds from BFR has arrived in Kenya and that consideration now is being made to the purchase of a truck to use in transporting the rhinos from the wild to the Ngare Sergoi Reserve or other protected areas. Everyone involved with this project should be justifiably proud of their efforts. Following is a letter, dated 24 July, which was received from Anna Merz, founder of Ngare Sergoi Rhino Sanctuary. We wanted to share it with all of you.



There are three National Chairman positions open for someone who would like to serve their national organization. They are:


