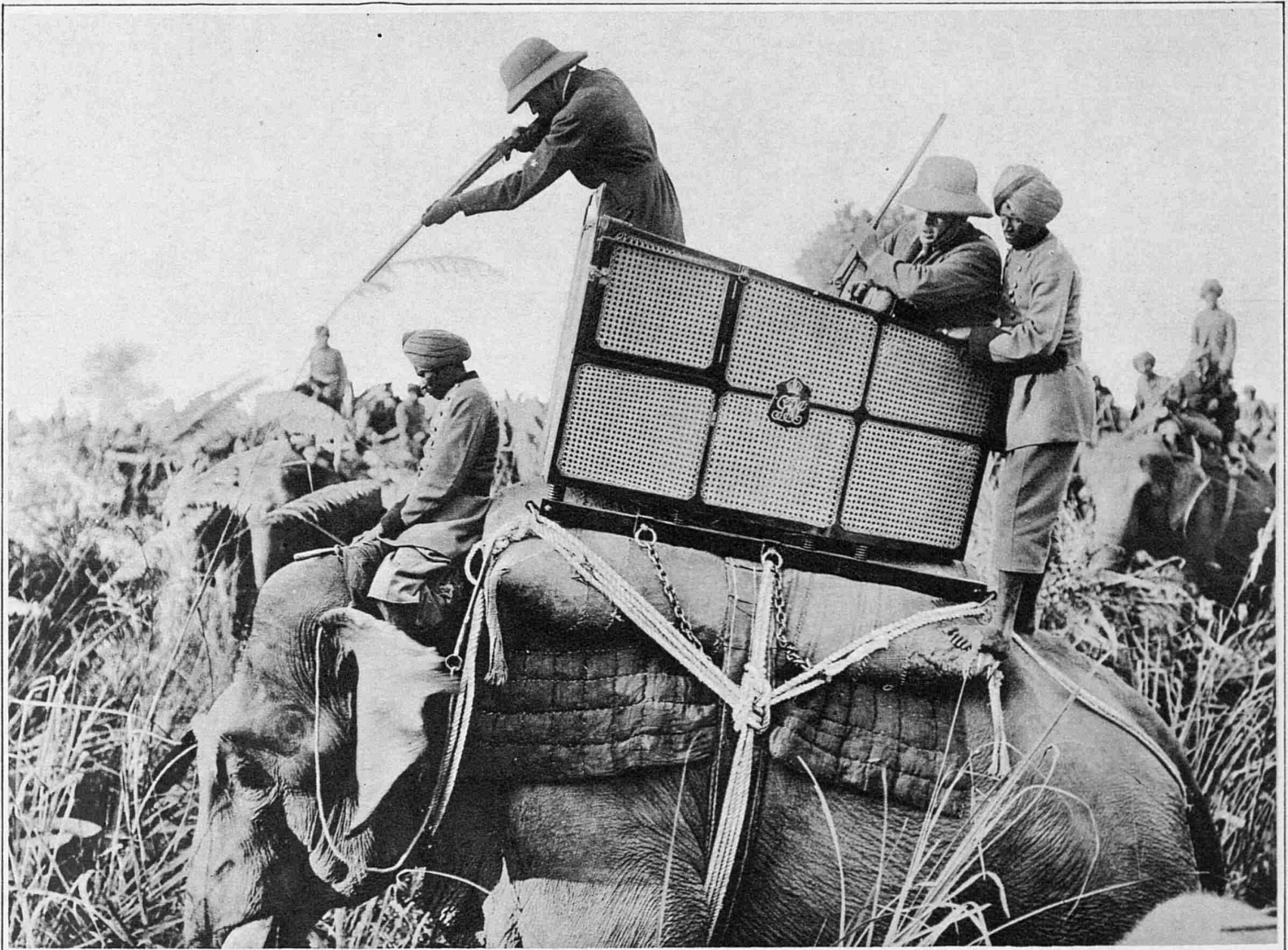


THE ROYAL SHOOT IN NEPAL IN 1911

Tiger, Rhino and Himalayan Bears in the Terai



A "ROCKETING" TIGER: On December 18, 1911, the King, during his Coronation Durbar tour of India, began a ten days' visit to Nepal, which lies between the Indian frontier and China. On the first day his Majesty bagged a tiger in mid-air as it was jumping a stream. In all 39 tigers, 18 rhino and four Himalayan bears were bagged during his stay. More than 600 elephants and two shooting camps were used. The suite, beaters, and attendants numbered no less than 14,000 persons!

During the shoot the King not only scored a right and left at tigers, but killed a tiger and a bear with a right and left. Sir Clive Wigram was chased for half a mile by an infuriated rhino
