THE JAVAN RHINOCEROS

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES

Sir,-It may interest your readers to learn that the Javan rhinoceros (Rhinoceros sondaicus), referred to in two letters by Mr. A. S. Vernay and Dr. W. T. Calman, F.R.S., published in The Times in June last year, has been recently discovered in Sumatra.

The discovery of this very rare animal in Sumatra, apparently in fair numbers, is of great importance to all interested in the preservation of these old-world animals. It was formerly thought that only a few specimens remained alive in Java and the Malay Peninsula, and, possibly,

in parts of Siam and Burma.

There can be no mistake about the identification of the species, as the record is accom-panied by photographs which prove beyond doubt that the rhinoceros is Rhinoceros sondaicus. This species was originally described from Sumatra, but it has always been a matter of doubt whether it really occurred in the island.
