THE JAVAN RHINOCEROS

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES

Sir,—It may interest your readers to learn that
the Javan rhinoceros (*Rhinoceros sondaicus*),
referred to in two letters by Mr. A. S. Vernay
and Dr. W. T. Calman, F.R.S., published in *The
Times* in June last year, has been recently dis-
covered in Sumatra.

The discovery of this very rare animal in
Sumatra, apparently in fair numbers, is of great
importance to all interested in the preservation
of these old-world animals. It was formerly
thought that only a few specimens remained alive
in Java and the Malay Peninsula, and, possibly,
in parts of Siam and Burma.

There can be no mistake about the identifica-
tion of the species, as the record is accom-
panied by photographs which prove beyond
doubt that the rhinoceros is *Rhinoceros
sondaicus*. This species was originally described
from Sumatra, but it has always been a matter
of doubt whether it really occurred in the island.
The rediscovery of the species in Sumatra sets
