L O N D O N, March 16.

**Y**esterday came Advice from Plymouth, that the 12th Instant failed from thence the Jason, Bridgewater, Kent, Salisbury, Eagle, and Bristol Men of War, with the King-Fisher and Raven Sloops of War, for the East-Indies, under the Command of Admiral Watson.

By the Friendship, Capt. Chalmer, arrived in Plymouth from the Streights, we have Advice of the Loss of the following Ships: The Hope, Twinto, of Weymouth, the Crew saved; and the Guernsey-Packet, Major, of Guernsey, all the Men drowned, except the Captain, who is made a Slave of; both lost near Tetuan. The Thomas and James, Millrie, of St. Aves, from Leghorn for Malaga, lost near Tangier, all the Crew drowned except the Master. And an English Vessel, Name unknown, lost off Gibraltar, and all the Crew perished.

They write from Gosport that all the Guardships are ordered to take in their lower Deck Guns, Stores, &c. in order to be ready for Sea at a short Warning.

We hear that the Sum of 3000l. is ordered to be paid to the Owners of the Vessel from Barbary, lately sunk off the Start Point in 35 Fathom Water; and that the surviving Persons are closely confined on board a small Vessel, and Provisions conveyed to them with the utmost Caution.

We hear that a Person of Eminence in a public Office will be prosecuted by the Attorney General with the utmost Rigour, for Male Practices in the late Lottery.

A Dutch Gazette informs us that the News brought to Ostend by a Vessel from Scotland, that seven British Men of War were expected in the Clyde, had given Rise to many Speculations concerning their Destination. Some pretended that they are to be employed in procuring by Force the Payment of the Capitals which his Prussian Majesty detains, by making Reprisals on his Subjects.

The French King's Forces appear by an authentick List to amount to 221,175 Men.

It is said the Right Hon. Henry Fox, Esq; has resigned his Place of one of the Chief Secretaries of State.

A few Days since died, at the Lizard in Cornwall, Mr. Samson Collins, aged 114; who retained his perfect Senses and Eyesight to the last.
