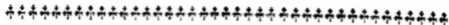

This Day arrived a Mail from Holland.

Madrid, July 31.

IT is reckoned that the Men of War, destined to reinforce our Guarda Costas in the West-Indies, will be ready to put to Sea in a Fortnight at farthest. Paris, Aug. 17. We are assured that some Commissaries will be sent in the Ships that are shortly to sail from Port l'Orient to Pondicherry, in order to give the Court a faithful Account of the State of Affairs in the East-Indies.

IRELAND.

Dublin, August 18. As the total Neglect of Tillage is now become very fashionable and polite in Ireland; we are assured, that two certain Jews, who furnished all the Armies in the late Wars, in Italy, Germany, France, Flanders, Holland, and Scotland, will undertake to supply this whole Kingdom with Bread and Corn for the future; which will save the Trouble and Expence of Husbandry in this Nation, and supply the French King yearly with at least an hundred thousand Irish Soldiers and Slaves for his Armies in Europe and Plantations in America, and will likewise starve the Christian Clergy of the established Church of Ireland.

COUNTRY-NEWS.

York, August 21. On Wednesday William Smith was executed, pursuant to his Sentence. He behaved to the very last in the most uncontented and insupportable Manner. His Body was sent to the County Hospital, where it has been dissected and anatomized according to the Directions of the late Act against Murder.

LONDON, August 25.

It is hoped the Parliament will next Sessions do something relating to the Game, especially as to the Time when People shall be allowed to go out to shoot or hunt; for as the Wheat was ripe this Year sooner than usual, tho' the Barley at that Time was in many Places green; yet Numbers of loose, idle People were out a Shooting in July, and Beginning of August, before Half the Wheat was reaped, or any of the Barley fit to cut, to the great Damage of the industrious Farmer: If none were to go a Shooting before Bartholomew Day, or a Hunting before Michaelmas Day, under a severe Penalty, the Corn would not be hurt, there would be more Sport, and the Game so well preserved by it, that there would be Plenty enough; but now the Birds are killed before they can fly, and the Levers before they can run, and by the Means of the People; for sure Gentlemen must be against wilfully injuring their Neighbours, by hunting Dogs, and shooting in the standing Corn; and if they go out a Shooting so early in the Season, they can't avoid it.

We are well informed that there has been a great Detachment of some Troops which had been sent to the East-Indies, to a Power that we cannot wish Success to.

Manchester, August 28. Last Week the Treasurer of the Infirmary receiv'd a Benefaction of 20 Guineas, from William Wright, of Mottram, Esq; by the Hands of the Rev. Mr. Clayton; and at the same Time Intimation was made, that the above Gentleman intended to be an annual Subscriber of 5 Guineas.

On Friday last was performed at the Collegiate Church in this Town, before the Trustees of the Infirmary, the following Anthem, set to Music by Dr. Boyce. 'Blessed is he that considereth the Sick and Needy, the Lord shall deliver him in the Time of Trouble. The Lord will preserve him and keep him alive; and he shall be blessed upon the Earth. The Lord will strengthen him upon the Bed of Languishing: Thou wilt make all his Bed in his Sickness. And when I am in Health thou upholdest me: And shall set me before thy Face for ever. I did weep with him that was in Trouble: My Soul was grieved for the Poor. I delivered the Poor that cried: The Fatherless, and him that had none to help him. The Blessing of him that was ready to perish came upon me: And I caused the Widow's Heart to sing for Joy. I was Eyes to the Blind, and Feet was I to the Lame: I was a Father to the Poor. Blessed be the Lord God of Israel: From Everlasting to Everlasting. Hallelujah. Amen.' After which a Sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Aishton, from Gal. vi. 9. And let us not be weary in Well-doing: For in due Season we shall reap, if we faint not. And on Sunday Afternoon a Sermon was preached at the Collegiate Church for the Benefit of this Charity, by the Rev. Mr. Foxley, from Matt. xiv. 14. And Jesus went forth, and saw a great Multitude, and was moved with Compassion toward them, and he healed their Sick; when a Collection of 80l. 14s. was made. One was also preached at St. Ann's Church for the Benefit of the said Charity, by the Rev. Mr. Owen, from Psalm xli. 1. Blessed is he that considereth the Poor: The Lord will deliver him in Time of Trouble; where 34l. 7s. was collected. And at the Disputing Meeting-house another was preached for the same Benefit, by the Rev. Mr. Motterhead, from Prov. xix. 17. He that hath Pity upon the Poor lendeth unto the Lord; and that which he hath given will he pay him again; where was collected 61l. 14s. 6d.
