MAMMOTH AND RHINOCEROS REMAINS FROM GALICIA.-Last October, while driving a shaft in the ozokerite mines at Starimia, the workmen came upon the remains of a mammoth at a depth of 15 metres from the surface. As they were not aware of the importance of the find, the remains suffered considerably in being brought to the top of the working. Instructions were immediately given as to the careful treatment of further remains; and in the following month, at two metres lower down, the head and forequarters of a rhinoceros were met with and brought up in good condition. Both appear to be the remains of animals that got bogged in the marshes, and were preserved by the mineral oil and salty shale with which they were impregnated. Dr. Von Kaufmann kindly sent to England photographs of the remains as they were brought to the surface, part of a rib of a mammoth, with the soft parts adherent, a piece of the skin, and some fraved-out hairs from the horn of the rhinoceros. These, which are to be presented to the Natural History Museum, were exhibited at the scientific meeting of the Zoological Society, on Tuesday evening, by Dr. A. Smith Woodward, keeper of the geological department, In describing them he said that the greater part of the mammoth had been secured for a private museum in Lemberg, but there was a possibility that the rhinoceros remains might be obtained for the Natural History Museum, if certain negotiations now in progress for retaining them in Austria were unsuccessful. He pointed out that the rhinoceros was not of the type one would expect to find associated with mammoth remains. The photographs showed no trace of wool, and the front horn, which was in its natural position, and the second horn, found some little distance from the body, were short and stout, while in remains from Siberia they were long and slender. With these were also found other mammalian remains, a few birds, amphibians, and mollusca.
