From the WHITEHALL and the GENERAL Evening Posts, &c. March 12.

Moscow, (a large City, the Capital of the Dutchy of Muscovy) February 7.

A Fire broke out the first Instant in the Palace of Le Fort, so called from Admiral le Fort, a Favourite of the Emperor Peter I. for whom it was built, by Order of that Emperor. It was a square Stone Building, with four Fronts, placed in the Middle of a very spacious Court. The late Emperor, Peter II. who died in 1730, kept his Court there, since which Time it has been neglected, and the Ornaments on the Inside have gone to Decay. For some Time past it has been occupied by the Empress's Gardes du Corps, consisting of 400 Men, who rank as General Officers, and who lodged in this Palace with their Families, so that it is reckoned there were near 3000 Persons in it. The Fire began above Stairs, and burnt with so much Violence, that in less than four Hours all the Inside of this Building was reduced to Ashes, and only the Stone Walls left standing. The Confusion and Terror which the Flames occasioned is not to be expressed. Several Persons being surrounded by them were obliged to jump out of a Window with their Children and Effects, and many lost their Lives in endeavouring to save themselves. In the Offices under the Palace there was a great Quantity of Gunpowder for the Use of the Guards, most of which was happily got away, but some which was left blew up. A few Days before the Fire the Empress had sent to this Palace a great Quantity of Plate, and several Chests of Money, imagining they would be more safe there than any where else. In removing the Chests the Bottoms of some of them broke, which occasioned some Mischief, the Guards being obliged to make Use of their Halberds and Bayonets to keep off the Populace, who, under a Pretence of lending their Assistance, ran away with all the valuable Effects they could lay their Hands on. The same Day a Fire broke out in the Suburb of Krasno-Zelo, which consumed only a few Houses of no great Consequence; and the Day before Yesterday another Fire happened in the Slabode, which consumed the House of a Secretary of the Chancery.

LONDON, March 12.

On Friday last, at the Assizes at Hertford, a young Woman, late Servant at the Red Lion at St. Alban's, was tried for the Murder of her Bastard Child, and found guilty; and Yesterday she was executed at Hertford for the same.

We hear from Cricklade in Wiltshire, that during the Severity of the late cold Weather Thomas Gore, Esq; through his great Bounty and Benevolence, ordered a Distribution of four Oxen, with a proportionable Quantity of Bread, amongst the Inhabitants of the said Town.

On Sunday his Grace the Duke of Devonshire came to Town from Chatsworth.

It is said, that his Grace will be appointed first Lord Commissioner of the Treasury.

On Sunday there was the most numerous Court at St. James's as has been this Winter, when the Right Hon. the Earl of Plymouth carried the Sword of State, for the first Time.

We hear that both Houses of Parliament will certainly break up on Tuesday evening; and that his Majesty will set out soon after for his German Dominions.

The Remains of the late Right Hon. Henry Pelham was carried out of Town this Morning, and is to lay to Night at the Lord Abergavenny's at Kidbrooke, and to go the next Day to the Duke of Newcastle's at Hall-End, from thence the Corpse will be carried to Loughton Church, and deposited in the Chancel, which is the Burying-Place of that honourable and noble Family.

We hear that if the Hon. Henry Fox, Esq; Secretary of War, succeeds the deceased Right Hon. Henry Pelham in the Administration, that the Hon. Col. Yorke will be made Secretary of War.

Last Week Thomas Joy, Darby M'Carthy, Thomas Fitz Gerald, and James M'Mahone, were committed to Newgate in Bristol, for enlisting themselves into the French King's Service.

Letters from Dublin inform us, that on Tuesday the 26th ult. between Ten and Eleven at Night, there appeared a Meteor in the Sky, which arose in the West, and resembled two human Bodies, which seemed to run at each other with great Rapidity, and illuminated the whole Hemisphere.
