described on a later page. On November 12th the Prince paid a visit to the Caves of Elephanta, and banquetted in front of the famous carvings which represent the Hindoo Triad. On the 15th a military review was held at Poonah, and a great ball at Government House, Bombay, was given the next evening.

A visit was paid to Baroda, where the Prince witnessed a grand, if somewhat barbarous, display of elephant, rhinoceros, and buffalo fights. He took just in an expedition for hunting deer with the cheetah, and enjoyed the Indian sport of "pig-sticking." Returning to Bombay for a farwell visit, he proceeded to the Portugues settlement of Goa, when he was received with royal bnours,

and arrived at Colombo on the last day of the month. In Ceylon, when he was elephant hunting, one of the infrarted animals made a dash stripgit at him, but the Prince fired and struck it in the head. It turned and escaped into the jungle. But he brought down another elephant, and "cut off the tail, according to custom, while the crowd cheered and cheered again as the Prince was seen standing on the prostrate body." At Madras he received the Maharajah of Travancere, the Rajah of Cochin, and the Prince of Arce; at Calcutt, Scindia and Holker, the Rajah of Coshmere and Jeypore, and many other native potentates. On Christmas Day the Prince attended service at the Cathedral of Calcutta, and was entertained at dinner by the Viceroy, and on the last day of the year he went to a public ball held in that che

But he will doubtless have presented to him many of the most eminent officers, civil and military. European and native, who under your Excellency bear rule among them, and he will see some of the most important divisions of that great army to which the defence of the Empire is confided, and in which his Royal Highness now bears the most exatted rank. His Royal Hichness will have the copportunity, which he will highly value, of personally
