Sir.-It will be of interest to those of your Rs. readers who are keen on "Shikar" to 'earn that a rhino has lately been shot in Assam which carried a horn 241 inches in length, lly,

exceeding by over 4 inches the horn in the Ipswich Museum, which, I believe, was previous to this the biggest existing specimen. In d. height the rhino stood 6ft. 4in, at the shoulder

measured between two stakes, one driven at the shoulder and the other at the foot, and feb not with a tape from foot to shoulder as is sometimes done. Thus besides carrying the

record horn he shares with one killed by the Maharaja of Kuch-Behar the honour of being ra. ice the biggest specimen of the Indian rhinoceros ever shot. I can personally vouch for the e; above dimensions as, although I had not the good fortune to be in at the death. I was on the spot a couple of hours afterwards and

nd th myself undertook the measuring, as Mr. T. Briscoe, formerly a Planter in the Tezpur District, who was fortunate enough to kill . this magnificent beast "on his lonesome," I wished to have no part in the determining of the measurements.

It is satisfactory to be able to relate that this record rhino was slain in the orthodox way, ofter a long track and an exciting finish in which the odds on the result were fairly
