Focus on Sumatran Rhinoceros



The Sumatran rhino is the most endangered of all rhinoceros species due to its rapid rate of decline. Because of poaching, numbers have decreased more than 70% over the last 20 years, with the only viable population now in Indonesia. The species was declared extinct in the wild in Malaysia in 2015. Sumatran rhinos exist only in protected areas where they are physically guarded by Rhino Protection Units. Continued protection, combined with consolidating small, fragmented populations into larger ones, and intensifying captive breeding efforts, are the best hope for the species' survival.

Biology

The Sumatran rhino lives in dense tropical forest, both lowland and highland, mainly on the Indonesian island of Sumatra.

This species is a browser and an opportunistic feeder with a very varied diet that may include more than one hundred plant species.

Sumatran rhinos live between 35 and 40 years. Gestation lasts approximately 15-16 months, and cows are believed to give birth to one calf about every 3 years.

These tropical forest dwellers are generally solitary in nature.

Current Sumatran Rhino Numbers and Distribution

Fewer than 100 Sumatran rhinos survive in fragmented populations in Indonesia's Bukit Barisan, Gunung Leuser, and Way Kambas National Parks, and a small population was recently found in central Kalimantan.

CITES: Appendix I

Common Names

Sumatran Rhinoceros

Asian Two-Horned Rhinoceros: the only two-horned rhino in the Asian region.

Scientific Name and Origin Dicerorhinus sumatrensis

"Dicerorhinus": from the Greek di, meaning "two" and "ceros", meaning "horn" and "rhinos", meaning "nose" and "sumatrensis" referring to Sumatra (with the Latin-ensis, meaning locality)

Physical Characteristics

Weight: 1,300 - 2,000 pounds (600 - 950 kg)

Height: 3 - 5 feet (1.0 -1.5m) tall at shoulder

Horn

Sumatran rhinos have two horns. The front horn is larger and measures 10 - 31 inches (25-79 cm) long. The second horn is smaller, generally less than 3 inches (10 cm).

Other Features: Fringed ears and reddish brown skin, and fur.



ABWAK Rhino Workshop comes to Fota Wildlife Park in July 2018



With one of the hottest summers on record in Ireland, the weekend of the ABWAK Rhino Workshop was no different. After approaching ABWAK's Rhino representative, Vicky Snook, in the winter of 2017 we put plans in motion to bring this workshop to County Cork. This was a great opportunity for Fota Wildlife Park to showscase its brand new greater one horned Rhino (Rhinoceros unicornis) exhibit which was completed in early 2015 as part of a new 27-acre Asian themed expansion of the collection. The first rhino to arrive at Fota Wildlife Park was Jamil, who came from ZSL Whipsnade on the 23 June 2015 followed by Shusto, who came from Terra Natura in Spain on the 26 November 2015.

This year we were very fortunate to have two sponsors; the International Rhino Keepers Association and Top-Spec. A big thank you goes out to both. Keepers came from far and wide, incuding the San Diego Zoo Safari Park, Dublin Zoo, Gaia Zoo, Marwell Zoo, Cotswold Wildlife Park, Wildlands Adventure Zoo Emmen, Edinburgh Zoo and ZSL Whipsnade, to name a few.



The predominant theme throughout the whole workshop was training and there were some very interesting talks on both days. Mike Veale, President of the Global Conservation Force, sent us a video showing us some of the incredible work that he and his team are doing for rhino conservation on a global stage. Any profit generated from the workshop will be sent over to help the wildlife rangers of the Global Conservation Force.

Weston Popichak from the San Diego Zoo Safari park gave a talk on recall training with six wild caught southern white rhino (Ceratotherium simum simum) cows. Hayley Mullaney from the Cotswold Wildlife Park who gave a talk on her little Tinkerbell, a southern white rhino calf that had to be hand-reared due to complications at birth. This very in-depth talk is a great resource for any other rhino keepers who might have to hand-rear a calf in the future

The workshop kicked off with a warm welcome, or Cead Mile Failte as we say in Ireland, from the Fota Wildlife Park Director, Sean McKeown. The opening talk of the day was done byme and my colleague, John Leahy. We are both part of the Hoofstock Team, which look after the two greater one-horned rhino bulls that reside at Fota Wildlife Park. We discussed initiating the first steps in our training program; from getting the rhinos used to presenting all four feet on blocks, to moving on to toe curls and the future for blood draws. We were able to demonstrate our routine weighing of the rhinos in our crush and how all the team now takes part in the training of both rhinos.

Afterwards Ken Mackey, from Dublin Zoo, gave a talk on crate training southern white rhino for transport. Sarah Kirby, from West Midlands Safari Park, gave a talk on routine safari management of their greater one-horned rhino. The last talk of the day was from Vincent van Dalen, from Wildlands Adventure Zoo Emmen, who gave a talk on how rhino healthcare can be improved by training.

Sunday morning's opening talk came from Christine Bobko of Denver Zoo. She described common foot problems she had seen in her black rhino (Diceros bicornis) and how she came up with a remedy for putting boots on affected feet to help with pain relief and to speed up recovery times.

Jonathan McLoughlin, an architect from Gillespies LLP, gave a talk on enclosure design that focused on creating enriching environment. Alisa Stockwell from Marwell Zoo gave a very interesting talk on early detection of lameness in southern white rhino. Afterwards we had probably one of the most exciting talks on bullet bound care, by Weston Popichak, on his southern white cow, Wallis. Next, we had a very informative talk on black rhino training from Jack Gradidge in Folly Farm.

After lunch we all met at the rhino house where we showcased some of the training we are doing with our greater one-horned bulls at Fota Wildlife Park. We demonstrated some recall and stationing, followed by foot work presentation and washing on a block.





The final talk of the weekend was a mini workshop, headed by Barbara Heidenreich, on Training and Behaviour Problems.

I would like to thank all my colleagues at Fota Wildlife Park for their assistance in organising and running this event. In addition we extend a big thank to our sponsors TopSpec and International Rhino Keepers Association.

Finally, a big thank you to ABWAK's Vicky Snook for helping us to bring this great workshop to Fota Wildlfe Park. We very much look forward to ABWAK Rhino Workshop in 2019!

Do you have any pets?


I currently have 3 dogs and one cat, and I am fostering 2 other cats - anyone need a cat?!?


