The cloaked figures in Plate XV, No. 102, are the least damaged part of a long procession of dressed-up men and women. Even from this pieces have been scraped away.

The circus-like picture (Plate XLIV, No. 78) was at the other end of the cave, also out of reach from the ground. I think the circles may possibly represent pools of water drawn without perspective. The lion, or leopard, and man are evidently jumping across, not through the ring by which they are.

Here we found the mangled remains of a drawing of archers, copied by M. Christol several years ago and published by him. But now that, too, is past tracing.

Any further exploration of the country-side for more caves was out of the question, as it was summer time, and thunder-storms came up almost every afternoon. The little Caledon, which was not low when we crossed, was reported to be steadily rising, so we dared not wait for further storms to make it impassable. As it was, we had some difficulty in getting back to Maseru.

CHIPPINGS

In the west corner of the Orange River Colony, six hours from Fauresmith, lies the little town of Luckhoff. This country is quite different
from the Conquered Territory or Basutoland. It is regular Karroo-veld,
with no grass, only the tiny, hardy plants called Karroo bush; no
mountains to catch the clouds and feed the streams, only bare plains
divided by the tiniest kopies; no overhanging rock ledges with caves
below, only bare, brown boulders on the hot veld. Across this scorching
country the Orange River flows through a belt of green trees, the only
cool and pleasant spot.

The Bushmen living in these parts could not paint, for they had no smooth and sheltered surface to work on. Instead, they have used the flat boulders and made a picture on the rock itself with a stone. Baviaan's Krantz, the property of the Orange River Farming Company, is in a sort of valley, twisting down to the river. The slightly raised land opposite the homestead is covered with such pictures on low stones. More are on a hillock by the river. The artist evidently sat on another stone. Perhaps he was waiting for game to pass to the water. There is no shelter of trees or rock, the sun blazes down on the place all day.

Plate XLVI, No. 81, is a rhinoceros. The outline is scraped out of the flat stone. The whole surface of the boulder is no bigger than



- the picture. Indeed, in the chipped designs the artists generally seem to have used up the full space available.
- Plate XLVI, No. 82. Near at hand is an ostrich entirely scraped out of the stone; the markings indicating feathers are chipped in the scraped-out surface.
- Plate XLVI, No. 83. The buck with scraped outline has some slight resemblance to a bontebok or blesbok. It seems to be eating.
- Plate XLVII, No. 84. This beast, with scraped outline and chipped markings, seems intended for a gnu or wildebeest; at least the thick tail, mane or hump on back and curved horns indicate that animal.
- Plate XLVI, No. 85. The head and forequarters of a hartebeest found just in this condition; there was no room for more on the rock.
- Plate XLVII, No. 86. The turned-back horns and slender hind-quarter of this outlined buck point to its being meant for a hartebeest.
- Plate XLVIII, No. 87. This buck has a chipped outline and chipped markings. The dewlap and neck lines show it is meant for an eland. The heavy build and hump are also there. In Sclater and Thomas's book of Antelopes, p. 29, mention is made of 'some curious horns which were at first ascribed to a new and unknown Antelope, but are now generally admitted to be nothing more than abnormal horns of the cow eland'. This animal seems to have similar ones.
- Plate XLIX, No. 88. These two, buck and ostrich, have scraped outlines and chipped markings which are for convenience coloured black here. The dewlap and neck markings are characteristic of the eland.
- Plate XLIX, No. 89. This very elementary elephant entirely fills the surface of a rock, on which he is graven. Perhaps that accounts for his wonderful stature. The want of brain space reminds one of the picture of elephants from Catherine's Post.
- Plate L, No. 90. A specially broad and flat stone bears these curious human figures. They certainly look like people of the stone age. One holds a club or knobkerry and a stick. But what the strange thing attached to him may be is not clear. A skin seems most probable. The other holds a stick and seems to be dragging something. The little elephant has evidently been drawn by the same or another artist, seated at the other side of the stone; hence the inverted position.
- Plate XLVIII, No. 91. Here, too, was another long-horned eland, somewhat similar to Plate XLVIII, No. 87, of Baviaan's Krantz.
- Plate XLVII, No. 92. This elephant is also scraped on sandstone. It is evidently seen in exact profile, so that each leg and tusk covers the other.
- The neighbouring farm, Roodekop, owned by Mr. Weidemann, lies quite close to Baviaan's Krantz.
- Plate LI, No. 93. Near the homestead is an oblong block of sandstone, on which the four elands are scraped. This is the most perfect piece
