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honor, and her foot being entangled in the stirrup, one of the attendants flew to her relief; which he happily effected: and was rewarded by a sentence of death, for having profanely dared to touch her Majesty's royal foot.

*Extract of a letter, received by a lady of Bristol, from her brother, an officer in the East-Indies, dated March 4th.*

“ Since I wrote my last I have been on a party to Agra, and Delhi, the seats of the Mogul Emperors, but alas, how fallen from their ancient splendor! The country desolated, tho’ no *English delinquent* ruled, and the city is a heap of ruins, whilst the few remaining inhabitants are destroying one another, by every means in their power. Believe me, my Eliza, the only parts of India I have seen which sleep in safety, are those that are so falsely said in England to have been ruined by the fraud, violence, and rapine of the Company’s servants. I am now on a shooting party on the banks of Buckarah-Lake, about 200 miles from camp, shooting and hunting in Eastern style. We are a party of seven gentlemen; our followers consist of about a thousand people of every denomination, and thirty elephants. Our game every thing from a snipe to the wild elephant, tyger, and rhinoceros; It is a mode of sporting that I never saw till this year, but exceeds my most sanguine expectation. If you have a map of India, you may view the spot I am now upon. You will find the lake near Gurruckpore; and your imagination can describe it with all that verdure that adorns its banks.”
