



Dublin Explorer's Death.

MRS. GREEN KILLED BY RHINOCEROS.

Mrs. Green, the Dublin woman who recently crossed the Belgian Congo, was killed last Saturday by a rhinoceros shortly after she had started on an attempt to climb Mount Keyna, in the Nanyuko district of the colony.

Mrs. Green was making her way to the foot of the mountain when she was confronted by a rhinoceros. She fired, but the animal was merely wounded, and charged. Mrs. Green was borne down and gored, receiving injuries from which she died before medical assistance could be obtained by her native bearers.

Mrs. Green, who had only a light repeating rifle, fired eight shots, which, however, only infuriated the rhinoceros, which charged her, gored her and trampled her to death. Afterwards the maddened animal ran amok, attacking everything living.

Some hours later the rhinoceros claimed a second victim. A Captain and Mrs. Atkins were motoring in the district when the animal suddenly appeared and charged the car. Both the occupants jumped out, but Captain Atkins was caught and killed. Mrs. Atkins, however, got away with the assistance of some settlers, who later found and killed the rhinoceros.

Mrs. Green was a well-known traveller and explorer. Her great walk from Lusambo, via Fort Portal, Uganda, and on to Nairobi, in Kenya, occupied eight months. She was accompanied only by native trackers and servants.

When she arrived in Kenya about two months ago she said that she left Ireland "because things were too lively there."
