

## Appendix 4: Notification of the proposed reserved forest in 1905

*The 1st June 1905.*

**No. 2441R.** — In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 5 of the Assam Forest Regulation, VII of 1891, the Chief Commissioner hereby declares that it is proposed to constitute as reserved forest in the interest of the preservation of game and lands described in the schedule hereto annexed, and appoints the Deputy Commissioner of the Kamrup district to be the Forest Settlement Officer to enquire into and determine the existence, nature, and extent of any rights claimed by or alleged to exist in favour of, any person in or over any land comprised within the limits as described in the schedule hereto annexed, and to deal with the same as provided in Chapter II of the Regulation.

Under the provisions of Section 5, sub-section (2) of the Assam Forest Regulation, VII of 1891, the Chief Commissioner appoints the Divisional Forest Officer, Kamrup, to assist the Forest Settlement Officer in the enquiries prescribed by Chapter II of the Regulation in connection with the proposed reservation.

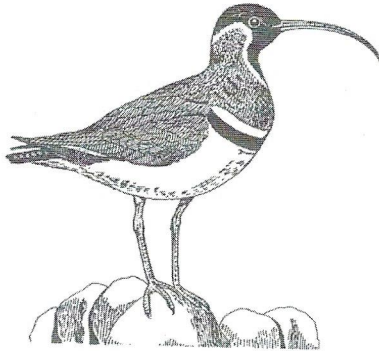
Under the provisions of Section 15 of the Assam Forest Regulation, the Chief Commissioner appoints the Commissioner of the Assam Valley Districts to hear appeals from the orders of the Forest Settlement Officer.
