# The Nursery

"BATHTIME seems to be an enjoyable part of the morning routine for the young apes," says Sue Schroeder, senior keeper at the San Diego Wild Animal Park Care Center. Shortly thereafter, one-year-old Jim Gorilla and seventeen-month-old Guy Orangutan

said "goodbye" to five fellow residents-two lion cubs, Sanetti (male) and Rueda (female), both born October 13, 1974; two male Southern White Rhinoceroses, Chaka born September 30, and Rott-ney born October 23; and a nilgai, Knu-berta, born September 29. All require rearing by hand. The lion cubs, baby rhinos and the nilgai were transferred to the Children's Zoo in Balboa Park. The reverse situation prevailed when Guy Orangutan was born at the Zoo on May 3, 1973, to Maggie and Bob. His transfer to the Park proved a fortunate circumstance when Jim Gorilla, born October 15, 1973, to Dolly and Trib at the Park, had to be taken to the Care Center. The two apes now are playmates and entertain Park visitors with their antics, even knocking on the windows to attract attention.

At the Children's Zoo in Balboa Park, the lion cubs joined a Pigmy Chimpanzee, Loretta Lynn, in the Starkey Nursery. The older rhino and the nilgai live in the paddock where two mischievous guanaco females, Nicole and Constance, prance among the sheep and goats. The younger rhino will remain in the off-stage nursery of the Clark Theatre until he outgrows his shyness.

nas are referred to as the camels of South America. Fossils found in the western United States led scientists to believe that the animals of the genus Lama and the genus Camelus had a common ancestry in North America, part of the animals migrating to South America (Lama) and the others going northward to Asia and then southward (Camelus). Among the several similar characteristics is the habit of spitting when angry.
