

1984 SNOW LEOPARD STUDBOOK PUBLISHED

Volume 4 of the International Pedigree Book of Snow Leopards was recently published by Dr. Leif Blomqvist. This volume includes data from field work and captive research in addition to listing live animals. Despite their protected status, four animals were removed from the wild in 1983, three from the Soviet Union and one from China. Details of international exchange programs involving zoos of Russia, Europe and North America are presented; and projected benefits to captive management are discussed. LOWLAND GORILLA BIRTH RECORDED

Recently, the birth of a lowland gorilla into a family situation was recorded as a first for the Oklahoma City Zoo. Most captive-born gorillas are not born into a family situation because the adults were wild-caught when they were very young and did not receive the socialization necessary to raise their young within a group. Gorillas born into a family situation are usually healthier and better adjusted, as well as more likely to reproduce in captivity.
