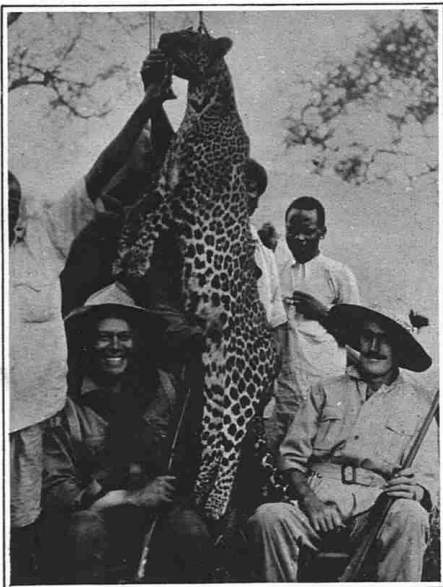

A BEAUTY OF THE PLAIN

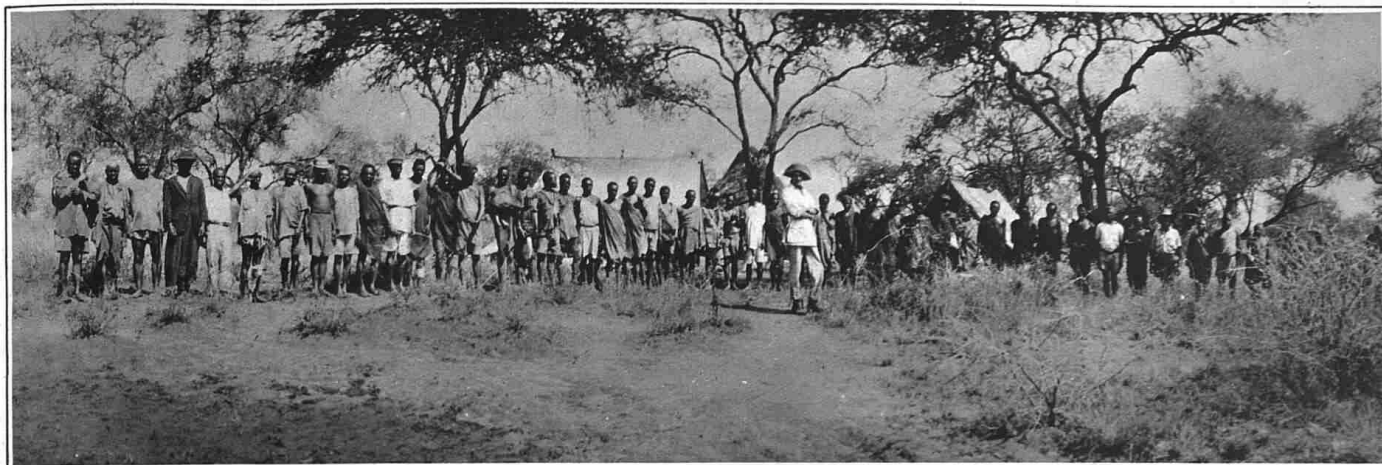

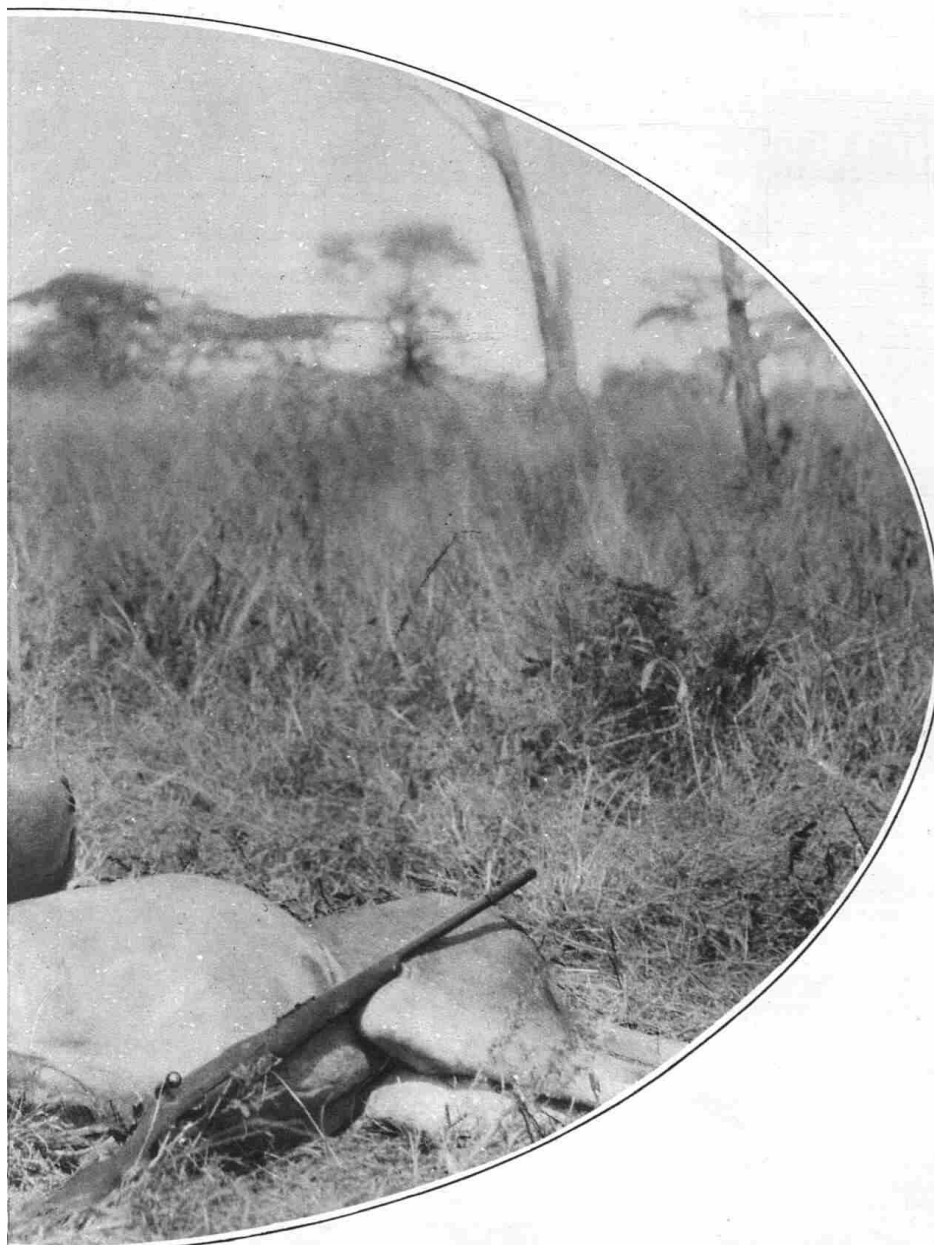
THE RECORD BLACK-MANED LION SHOT

This lion measured 11 ft. 3 in. The largest Mr. Selous killed was only 9 ft. 11 in., although the pegged-out skin stretched to 11 ft. 9 in. A good idea of the size of this lion is got by comparing the size of one of its toes, as compared with Mr. Beckley's hand. The manes of lions differ in size and colour, and are rare

BECKLEY'S RECORD BAGS OF BIG GAME

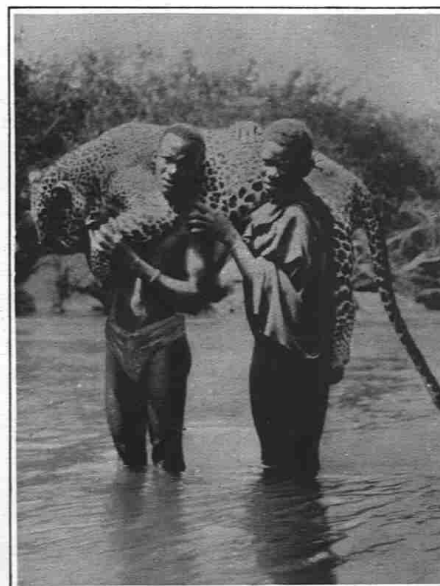


MR. BECKLEY'S NATIVE HELPERS AND HIS BRITISH GUIDE AND COMPANION, MR. J. HERON MAXWELL

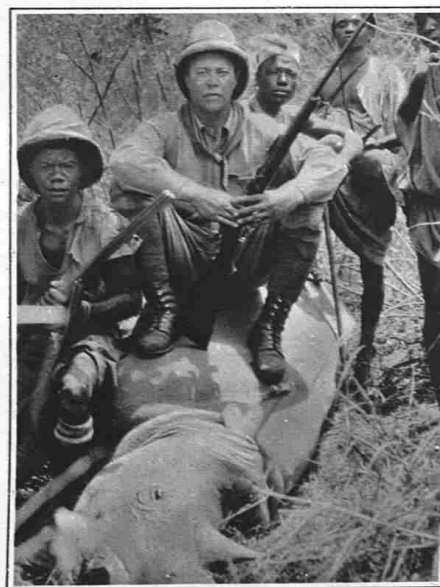


MR. BECKLEY ON THE ITHANGA PLAINS

among bush-grown lions, and never so abundant as with lions bred in menageries. Between January 1, 1910, and December 31, 1911, the recorded number of lions bagged in the British East Africa Protectorate was 795, but the bag was probably greater. In Kenya a visitor's sporting licence for a year costs £100.
