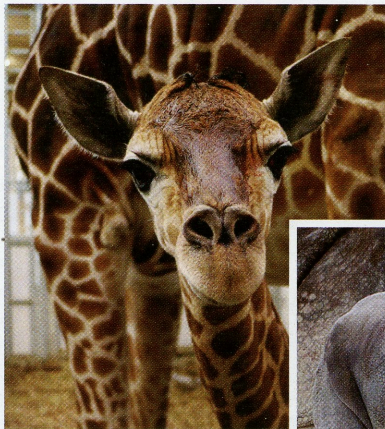


Births & Hatchings

OMAHA'S HENRY DOORLY ZOO AND AQUARIUM

Omaha, Nebraska

Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo and Aquarium welcomed a female giraffe calf on 16 April. The calf weighed 152 pounds and was measured at approximately six feet tall at birth. There are currently 11 giraffe at the Zoo—one male and ten females, including the calf.



ZOO MIAMI

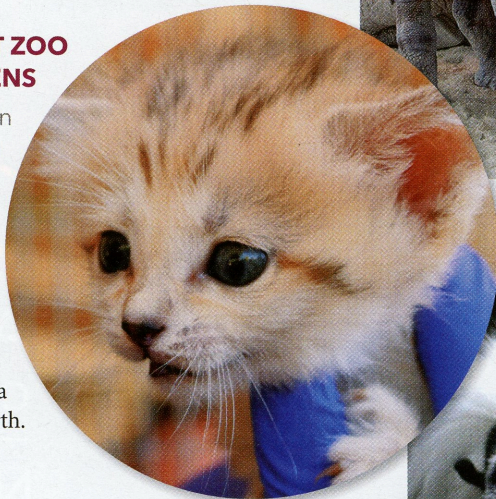
Miami, Florida

An Indian one-horned rhino was born at the Zoo in April. This is only the second successful birth of this rare species in the Zoo's history. However, what makes this birth historic is that it is the first successful birth of this species to result from induced ovulation and artificial insemination.

LIVING DESERT ZOO AND GARDENS

Palm Desert/Indian Wells, California

The Living Desert Zoo and Gardens announced the birth of four sand cat kittens. This is the inaugural birth in the Zoo's Desert Carnivore Conservation Center and is also the first sand cat birth at the Zoo since 2004. This was a Species Survival Plan® birth.



NASHVILLE ZOO

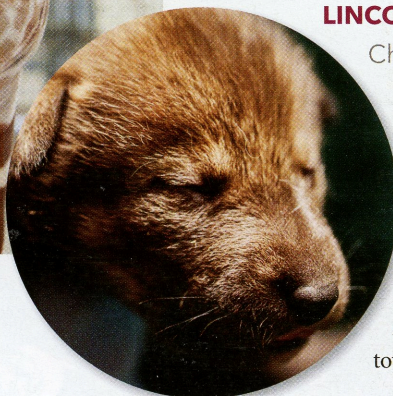
Nashville, Tennessee

The Zoo announced the birth of two cotton-top tamarins on 20 April. This is the second birth of cotton-top tamarins twins since the opening of Expedition Peru: Trek of the Andean Bear in March 2018. This was an SSP recommended birth.

WOODLAND PARK ZOO

Seattle, Washington

The Zoo announced the birth of a giraffe calf on 2 May. Giraffes have a gestation period of 14 to 15 months. Giraffes give birth standing up and the calf drops five feet to the ground as it is born. Baby giraffes are typically born at six feet tall and stand within an hour of birth.



LINCOLN PARK ZOO

Chicago, Illinois

The arrival of spring brought a litter of four critically endangered red wolf pups to the Pritzker Family Children's Zoo at Lincoln Park Zoo. The pups, two male and two female, were born on 13 April. Native to the eastern United States, red wolves were driven toward extinction by hunting.
