ZOO MIAMI

Miami, Florida

For the first time in the Zoo's history, a North Island kiwi hatched at the Zoo. Zoo Miami received the fertilized egg on 15 March from the Smithsonian National Zoological Park in Washington, D.C., where it was laid on 29 January.



DISCOVERY COVE

Orlando, Florida

Discovery Cove® announced the birth of two spotted eagle rays, a threatened marine species which is a part of the Species Survival Plan®. Born 2 April, the pups received around-the-clock, world-class veterinary care from Discovery Cove's team.



NASHVILLE ZOO

Nashville, Tennessee

The Zoo announced that River, the on-exhibit clouded leopard, gave birth to three cubs, two males and one female, in April. The two males are particularly important because there were no males born at Association of Zoos and Aquariums-accredited facilities in 2018.



NEW YORK AQUARIUM

Coney Island, New York*

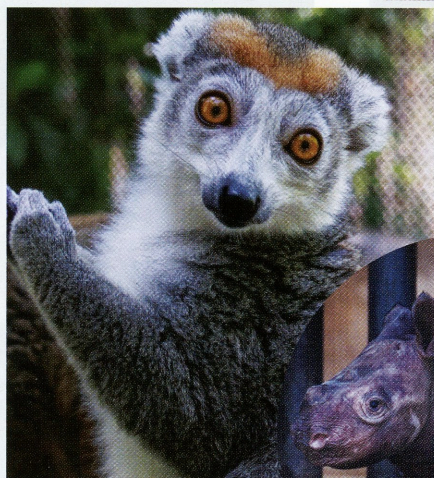
The Aquarium's breeding program for the African black-footed penguin has added four more chicks to its colony. The four penguins are now on public view at the Aquarium's Sea Cliffs habitat. The Aquarium's colony now numbers nearly 30 birds.



ZOO ATLANTA

Atlanta, Georgia

A crowned lemur was born 4 May 2019, to parents Sava and Xonsu. Female Sava, and male Xonsu, were recommended to pair by the SSP. Classified as Endangered by the International Union for Conservation of Nature, crowned lemurs are found on the northernmost tip of Madagascar.

Chicago, Illinois

An eastern black rhino calf was born at the Zoo on 19 May. This was an Eastern Black Rhinoceros SSP birth. Numbers of eastern black rhinos continue to dwindle in the wild due to poaching.
